Saint Stephen's Stole ("Ourar")

In Christianity, the stole ("*Ourar*" in Armenian) denotes the duty to spread the Word of God. The word "Ourar" derives from Orarion (Greek), the distinguishing vestment of the deacon and sub-deacon in the Eastern Orthodox, Oriental Orthodox and Eastern Catholic churches. In order to be allowed to wear a stole, a boy/young man has to go to seminary and learn about the rituals, history, and teachings of the Armenian Church. The "ourar" worn in the Armenian Church is a straight piece of cloth that hangs over the left shoulder. The "ourar" is worn crisscrossed across the back for episcopal liturgies only and is always with a partnering 2^{nd} deacon.



SUPPLIES NEEDED

- Crepe paper/Party streamers (Red and/or Blue, would work best)
- Markers
- Scissors
- Safety pins
- Gold or yellow construction paper
- Picture of St. Stephen use your own or print out the one that follows (pg. 2)

PREPARATION BEFORE ACTIVITY

- Cut crepe paper into 2-4 feet strips
- Cut Armenian crosses from gold or yellow construction paper, not bigger than the width of the crepe paper (*2 for each child*)

WHAT TO DO

- 1. Share with students a picture of St. Stephen, (to follow).
- 2. Give each student a strip of crepe paper. Have them lay it completely flat. (You may want to allow them to work on the floor.)
- 3. Using scissors, instruct students to cut "fringe" at each bottom edge.
- 4. Give each child 2 construction paper crosses and have them glue them slightly above the "fringe."
- 5. Using markers, instruct students to write down the middle of crepe paper:
 - "St. Stephen" or
 - "St. Stephen" down the front and "1st Deacon" down the back
- 6. Optional: Using markers, students may draw additional Armenian "CROSSES" along the crepe paper.
- 7. Attach crepe paper stole to the child's shoulder with a safety pin.
