

An Apparition of a Holy Cross

The feast of the Apparition of the Holy Cross:

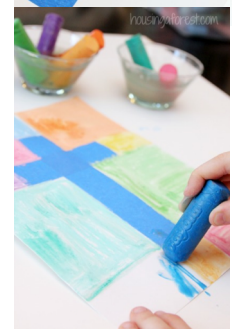
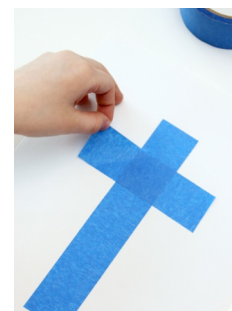
At noon on May 19, 351, a bright and luminous cross appeared over the skies of Jerusalem, centered over an area spanning from the Mount of Olives (where Christ was betrayed and arrested) to Golgotha (where Christ was crucified). The Armenian Church celebrates this feast 28 days following Easter Sunday.

Supplies:

- Colored chalk or crayons
- Water
- Painters Tape
- Sturdy paper
- Template (to follow) - *print & cut before class*

Instructions:

1. If using chalk, soak the chalk in a bowl of water.
2. Use the Painters Tape to create a cross shape on your paper.
3. Using the wet chalk (or crayons), paint/color a colorful design on the paper. Wet chalk has a consistency similar to paint and the colors will appear richer and deeper than dry chalk. Your students will be intrigued when it glides smoothly across the paper leaving a beautiful thick paste.
4. Allow the chalk and paper to dry before gently and very slowly removing the tape to reveal an “apparition of a holy cross!” To avoid tearing, remove the tape very slowly. Give each child a copy of the “Apparition” summary to glue to back.



Cut apart squares. Each child needs 1 square to glue to the back of their picture.
