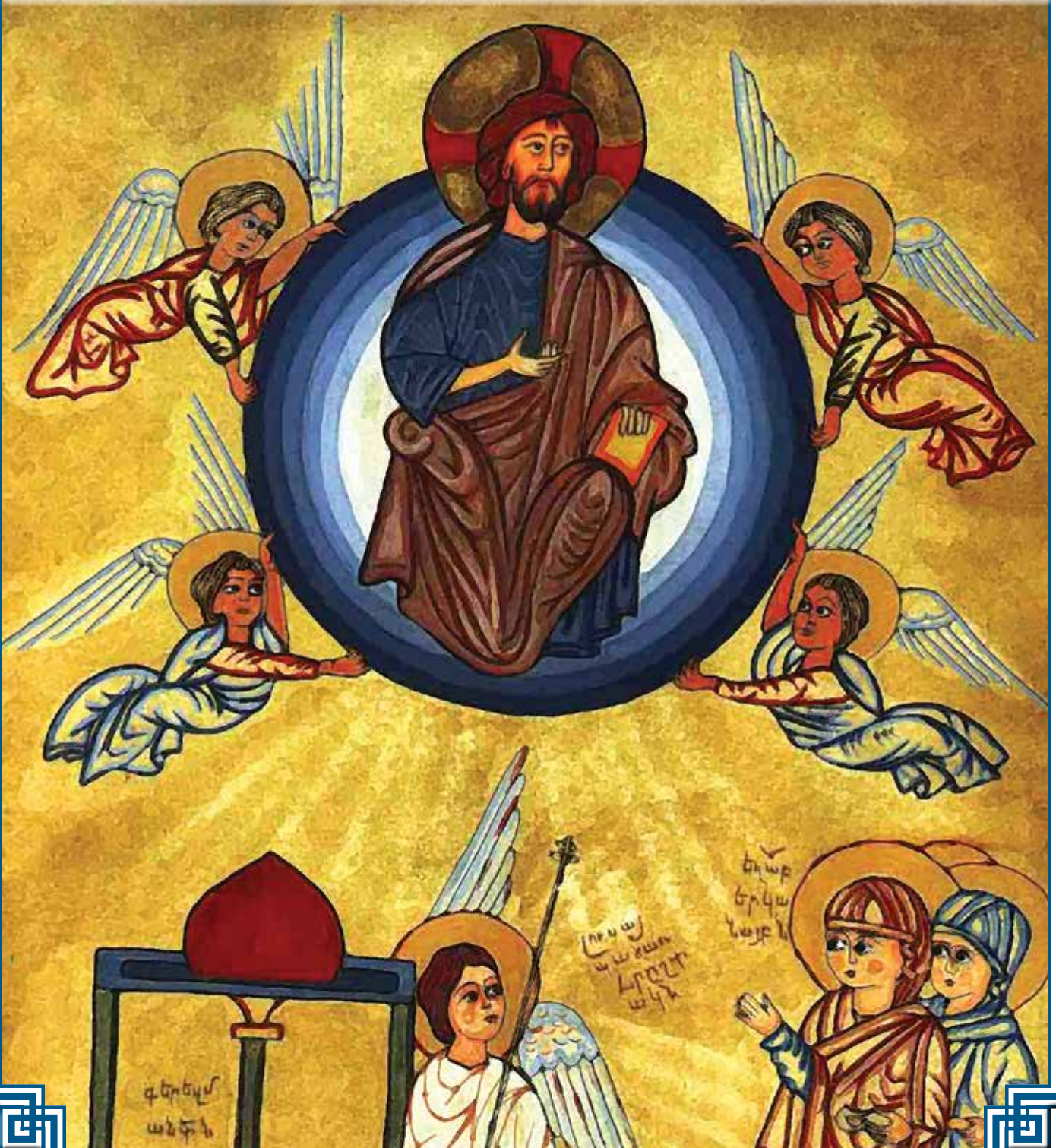

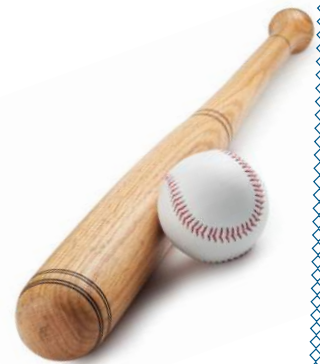

Our Story

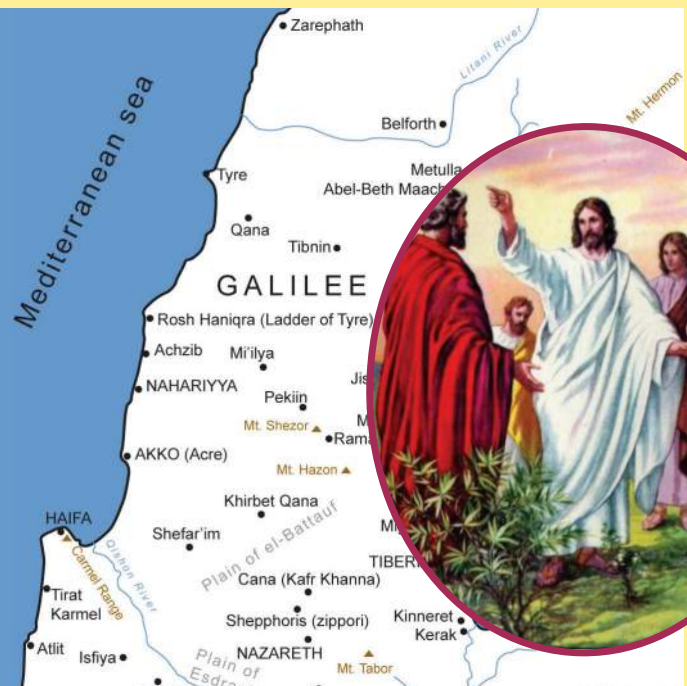

God's Word

Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. And when they saw him they worshiped him; but some doubted. And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, to the close of the age." *Matthew 28:16-20*



We Learn About God

Jesus chose his 12 disciples to carry out his work on earth. In many ways, the disciples (Jesus' students) were also his messengers. Before Jesus returned to heaven, he had one final meeting with his disciples to give them their biggest job. They were to go and tell everyone about Jesus. It is because of the disciples and their great work of sharing Jesus' message that we are Christians today. You see, God did not want us to be alone. All of us praying together and sharing Jesus' love make up the church. The church is not a building. The church is a family of people who pray together. We are members of God's family. We sing a very special hymn that reminds us that Jesus is with us during Badarak: "Kreesdos Ee Mech Mer," which means Christ among us.

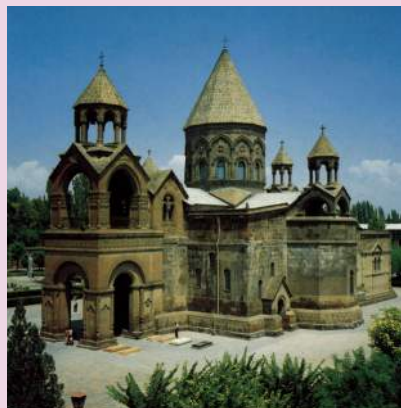

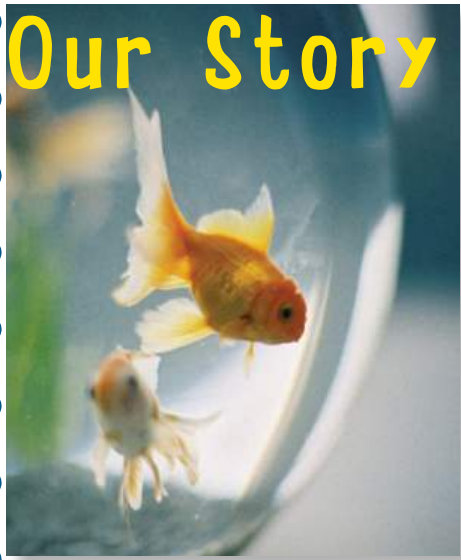

God created the world a very long time ago. Every step of the way, God had a plan that was always right and good.

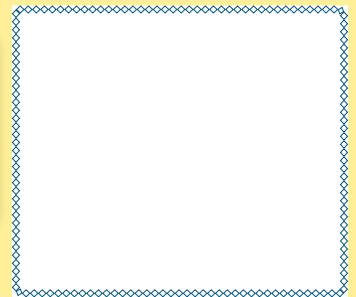
1. First, everything was dark, so God created light which was the day and the darkness was called night.



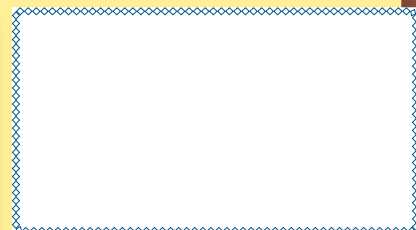
2. On the second day, he separated the sky from the oceans. *Draw a cloud you would see in the sky.*



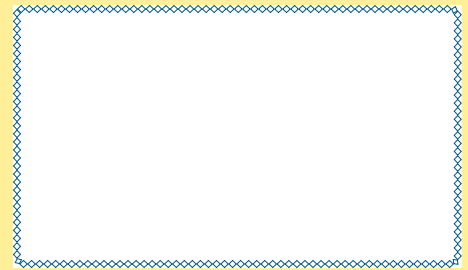

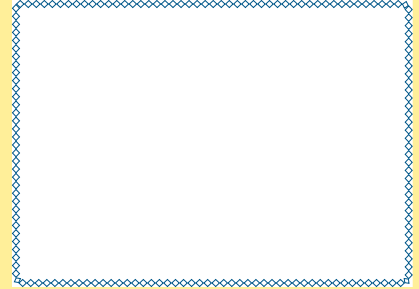
4. On the fourth day, God added lights to the sky, the larger one called the sun and the smaller one called the moon and all the stars. *Draw the sun, moon, and some stars.*



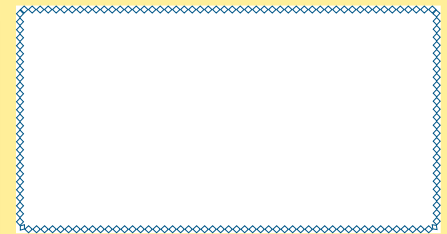
5 On the fifth day, God created all the birds to fly the skies and all the sea creatures to swim the seas. *Draw a bird in the sky and a fish in the sea.*

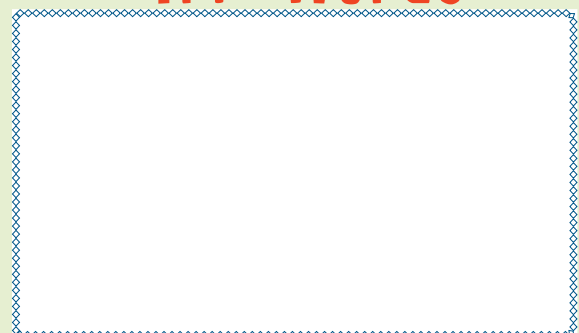
We Learn About God

At school, you probably complete many math lessons and solve different types of equations such as $3 + 7 = 10$, $2 + 4 + 6 = 12$, and so on. Well, the most famous equation in the Bible is the following: **Father + Son + Holy Spirit = God**. This equation makes up the **Trinity** because the prefix "tri" stands for number three.

God has always been here. No one created him. Our Scripture reading for today gives a very important clue telling us that Jesus and the Holy Spirit were in fact present at Creation. If God is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit then we know that they were all there. Everything comes from God! When we pray we make the sign of the cross. Did you ever stop to think that the three fingers that you use represent the Trinity? The three fingers come together as if they are glued to make one sign for God. As we make the sign of the cross we are reminding not only ourselves but others that we belong to God.

Our Armenian Way

The Armenian Cross has special features. It is often pictured with grapes and wheat and sometimes leaves and flowers coming out of the base. These stand for the hope of new life that comes from the Cross of Christ. Grapes and wheat also stand for Holy Communion.

Each arm of the cross ends in a three-pointed design, reminding us always of the Holy Trinity.

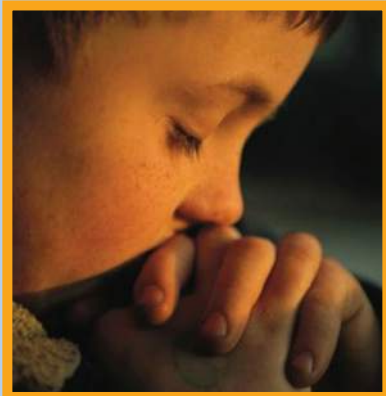

Today second graders were reminded that everything comes from God. We reflected on the beauty of the world and drew images from the 6 days of creation as written about in Genesis 1. The children reviewed signing themselves with the cross - each time we make the sign of the cross, we are reminded of our Christian belonging and that God is always with us. They also made a beautiful stand-up cross.

Living Our Faith

1. Place your child's cross at the center of the dining room table to be visible at mealtimes.
2. Ask your child to identify favorite aspects of God's creation and thank God for his gifts to us.
3. Alternate saying the sign of the cross in both Armenian and English during family prayer time so your child may hear it in both languages.

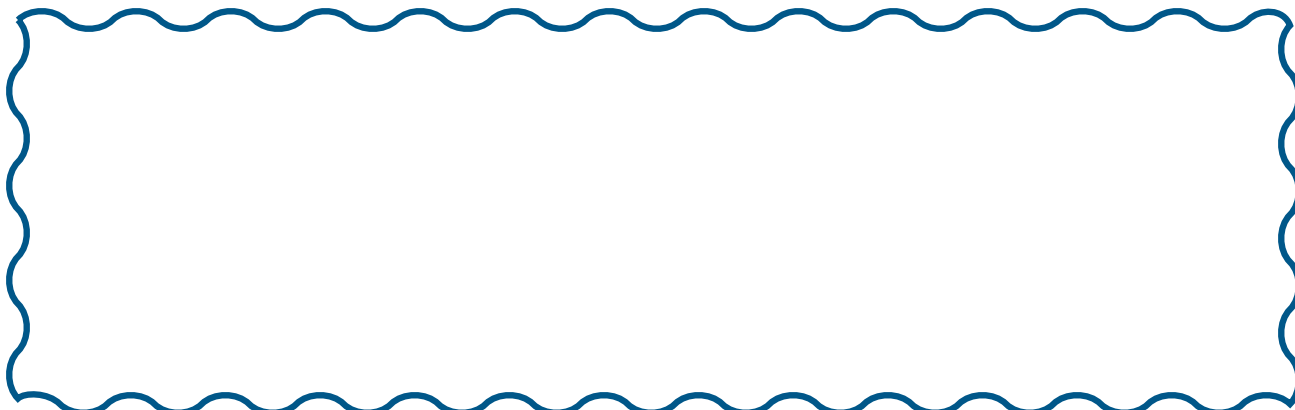

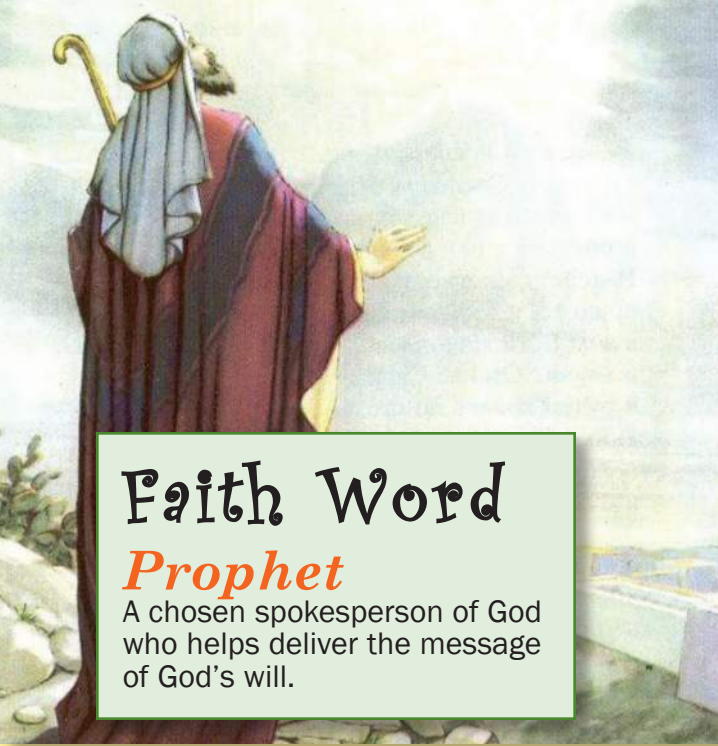
"What if no one likes me? What if my parents forget to pick me up? What if I get sick?" All of a sudden there were too many "what ifs."

Jesus, Wonderful, glorious in every way.

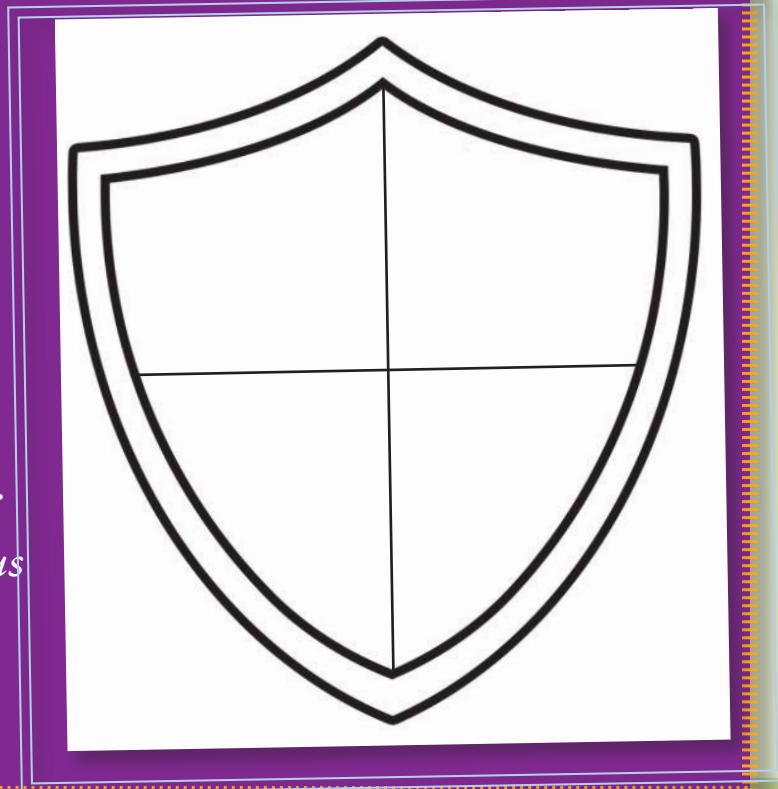

Each Sunday in the Armenian Church, we sing *Vortee Asdoodzo* as a reminder of God's wonderful gift of his Son, Jesus. This beautiful hymn is sung in preparation for Holy Communion. We are thanking Jesus for his sacrifice on the cross for our sins.

St. Nersess Shnorhali, (the Gracefilled) is considered one of our greatest Church Fathers. He was a Catholicos and also known for his many prayers, hymns and poems praising God. One of his poems, Jesus Son (*Heesoos Vortee*), is a long poem that tells about the Old Testament, the life and teachings of Jesus and his crucifixion.

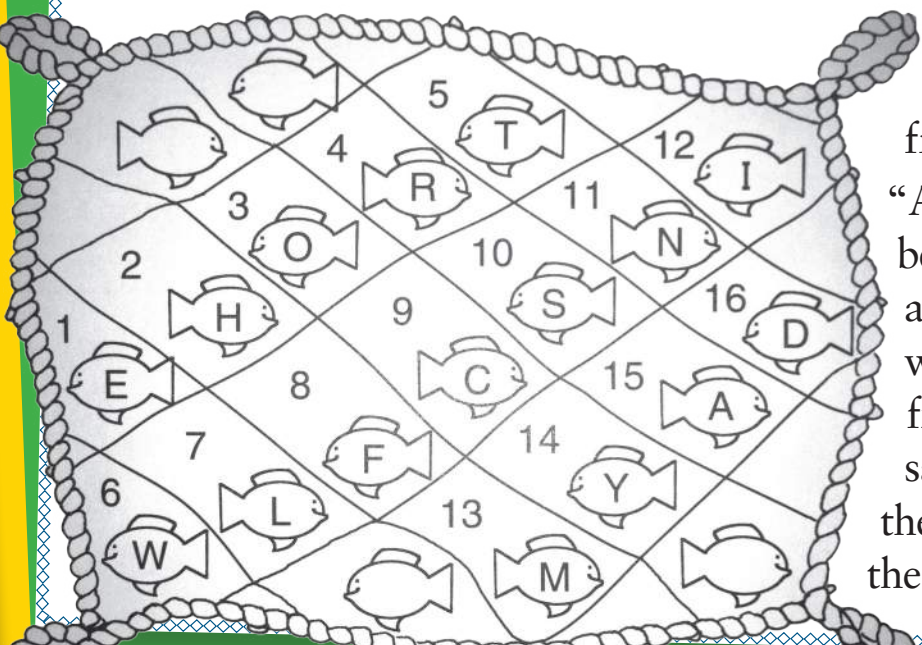

Here's a very famous story from the Gospel of Mark (1:16-18) about how Jesus called the first few disciples to follow him and learn God's ways.

“Passing along the beach of Lake Galilee, Jesus saw Simon and his brother Andrew fishing. Fishing was their regular work. Jesus said to them: ‘Follow me. I'll make a new kind of fisherman out of you. I'll show you how to catch men and women instead of fish.’” They didn't ask questions... What happened next? You will be given some math problems. Solve them and fill in the blanks.

Here's the rest of the story from Mark (19-20):

“A dozen yards or so down the beach, he saw the brothers James and John, Zebedee's sons. They were in the boat mending their fishnets. Right off, he made the same offer. Immediately, they left their father Zebedee, the boat, and the hired hands, and followed.”



Our Story



Once a month, Vartan's Sunday School attends Badarak and hears a special sermon prepared just for them by their Der Hayr. It's always a fun Sunday because everyone has a chance to sing *Soorp Asdvadz* together, participate in the Kiss of Peace, receive Holy Communion and listen to a talk just for the kids. On a particular Sunday, during the sermon, Der Hayr kept on talking about how the church is really not a building but is made up of people. He kept on saying that the faithful make up the church, and everyone has an important job.

Vartan, who wants to be an engineer one day, was really stumped by Der Hayr's message. He was so confused as he looked around and saw walls, beams, a roof, windows – the church was definitely a building – how could it be anything else?



After services, Vartan had the courage to go up to Der Hayr and ask him his question. Der Hayr smiled and reassured Vartan that the church was a building but also and more importantly, it was the Body of Christ. Der Hayr continued to say that the church was like the human body. Christ is the head, and all of us represent the different parts of the body. Each part has a special job and if it is not working properly it affects the entire body. The same is true for the church; all of us work together as a family under Christ. No one person is more important than the other. Der Hayr told Vartan that as part of God's family, he and all of his Sunday School friends have a special role in the church. Vartan was glad that he

spoke with Der Hayr and started thinking about his role in the church.

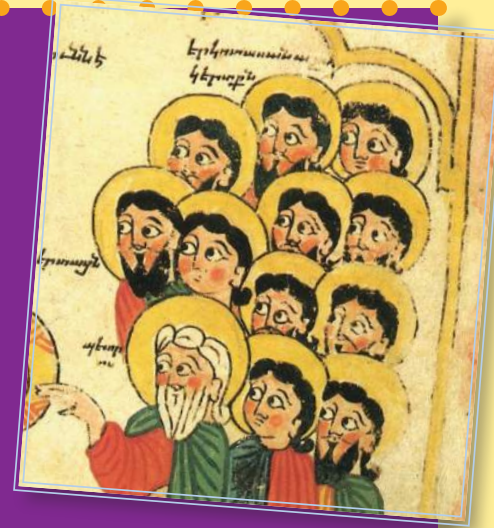

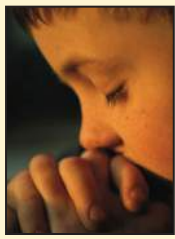

We Learn About God

Let's visit our friend Vartan again from our story. The following Sunday he asks his Sunday School teacher about what he and his classmates can do in the church. Vartan took his job in the church very seriously as he was only seven years old. Their teacher said that all members of the church help others know and share Jesus' love. She also said that the Sunday School students are like the new disciples, learning about Jesus and sharing his love with others. So even as a student, Vartan had a special job. Their teacher also said that each Sunday, right before the priest gives his final blessing, he says a special prayer written by one of our Church Fathers, St. John Chrysostom. The prayer asks God to bless each person in the church for everything that they do. The prayer makes sure that no one is forgotten.

Our Armenian Way

The Armenian Church, like other churches, is blessed with important parish helpers. On any Sunday, aside from the priest, there are several people serving at the altar. The deacon (*sargavak* in Armenian) is a special helper who is ordained by the bishop in the church. To be ordained means to receive a blessing and special rights to do things in the church. The deacons wear a robe called a *shabig* with a stole called an *oorar* over the left shoulder. To be a deacon requires time and practice.

Our Story

For as long as Ani Hovsepien could remember, her mom Lucy was always home and ready to greet her after school. Her mom was the one who would help her with homework, bake cookies, cook dinner, help in the classroom, read bedtime stories, and take her to ballet class,

play dates and the doctor. For Ani, things were about to change as she started the second grade. Ani's mom was going back to work after being home for seven years!

One evening at dinner, Lucy announced that her new job was going to require some traveling. Her first business trip would be next week and she would be gone for the entire week. "A whole week?" Ani was upset – a week seemed forever. Ani's mom arranged to have grandma come over and spend the week while she was gone. For the days leading up to the trip, Ani would mope around the house begging her mom not to go. She would ask, "What if I get sick, or don't understand my homework, or have nightmares?"

For every worry, Lucy would hug and kiss Ani reassuring her that she would be just fine. Ani's mom also promised that she would call and text her every day so that Ani could hear her voice and communicate. Lucy also promised to bring back something special for her. Ani's mom made sure that she would be taken care of and have nothing to fear.

God's Word

During the Last Supper, Jesus spoke about many important things with his disciples. It was Jesus' last meal with his disciples, one of the very last times they would all be together. He told the disciples that in the near future he would be returning to heaven to be with his Heavenly Father. The thought of Jesus leaving the disciples caused a lot of fear and sadness. What were the disciples going to do without their leader, Jesus? Jesus reassured them that he would send the Holy Spirit in his place. The Holy Spirit was going to come and offer comfort, share Jesus' love, teachings, and truth and reveal what would happen in the future. Everything that the Holy Spirit was sent to do and say was also in the name of God the Father and Jesus.

We Learn About God

Remember our friend Ani? She was scared that her mom was going to leave her when she went on her business trip. Her mom comforted her by saying she would be back and as a way to keep in touch, they were going to text and talk on the phone each day. Just as in Ani's story, Jesus reassured his disciples that they would not be forgotten. He gave his word that they would have someone to take care of them when he was gone. Jesus promised to send the Holy Spirit to help the disciples pray, teach others about Jesus, and give them strength, courage and faith.

Hokee Asdoozo, meaning *Spirit of God*, is a beautiful hymn (*sharagan*) sung during the Divine Liturgy. In the *sharagan* we are praying to God that he send his Holy Spirit on the gifts of bread and wine and make them truly the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. We also pray that the Holy Spirit blesses those members of our church family who have died.

Our Armenian Way

In the Armenian Church, the dove (*aghavnee* in Armenian) symbolizes the Holy Spirit. If you have ever attended an Armenian baptism or remember your own through pictures or video, you will notice that the priest blesses the water with a very special oil called Holy *Muron*. The priest also anoints nine parts of the body with the muron during the sacrament of chrismation, which follows right after baptism. The Holy Muron is stored in a dove-shaped container as a reminder of the Holy Spirit. During chrismation, the muron acts as a special seal, representing the gift of the Holy Spirit who guides, protects, and strengthens the newly-baptized Christian.

2. During Badarak, point out the sharagan, *Hokee Asdoodzo*, and sing with your child.
3. Revisit the pictures of your child's baptism and discuss that special day.

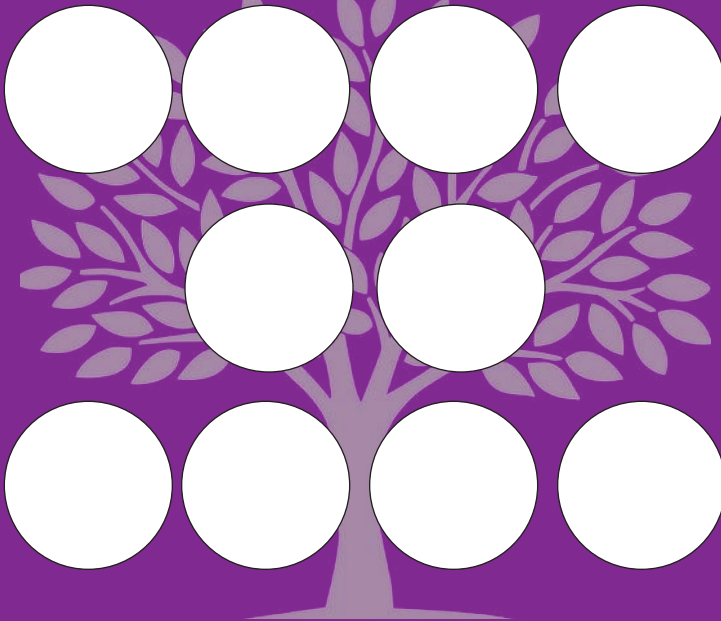

Our Armenian Way

Every member of the Armenian Church throughout the world belongs to a parish church. Although each Armenian parish is unique, there are many characteristics which are the same.

Our parishes are named after a special saint (St. Gregory, for example) or an event (Holy Resurrection, for example) and the church is often built in the shape of a cross. Each Sunday we celebrate Divine Liturgy (*Badarak*). Our parishes are led by a priest whom we call Der Hayr or Hayr Soorp. We have altar servers and choir members. The parish council is a group of people who help take care of the church's needs. There is often a ladies society or women's guild, Sunday School, Armenian School, and youth group.

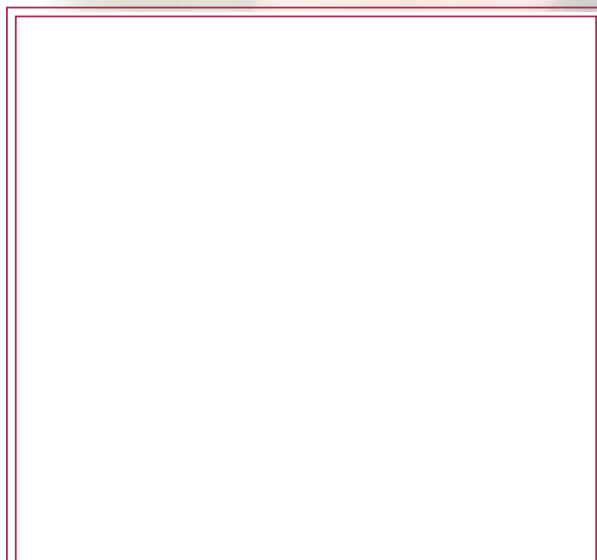
In our parish we celebrate happy occasions such as weddings, baptisms, and picnics and we come together to comfort each other at funerals. Just like our family at home, our parish is our Christian family where we all enjoy each other's friendship and also worship together and serve God and others.

We Learn About God

Our Scripture readings for this lesson remind us how important it is to pray to God. Even though we can't telephone God or mail him a letter, we can certainly still talk to him through prayer. God is always listening. We can pray at home, alone, and we can pray at church, together. In our church services, there are times that we pray together as a group and times where we are on bended knee praying alone.

During the Divine Liturgy, there is a time when we place our two hands tightly together and, as one church family, chant a prayer that sums up our beliefs. This special prayer of faith is called the Nicene Creed, the *Havadamk* in Armenian. It explains God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.

Before Holy Communion, we kneel and pray while the choir sings *Der Voghormya*, a hymn that means “Lord have mercy.”

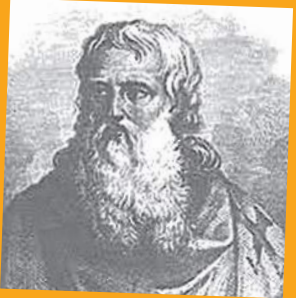
It is during this prayer and hymn that we ask God to remember family and friends who might be ill or those who have died.

Our Armenian Way

If the Armenian Church had superheroes then St. Gregory of Narek and St. Nersess Shnorhali would definitely be part of that group! These two saints wrote many prayers, poetry, and songs and some are used in our Divine Liturgy. They were both from very religious families and had a deep love for God.

St. Gregory of Narek wrote a special prayer book containing 95 prayers, called *Speaking to God From My Heart*, which shared his feelings about God.

St. Nersess Shnorhali wrote many prayers, hymns and poems praising God. One his of best known prayers is “I Confess with Faith” which has 24 verses, one for each hour of the day.

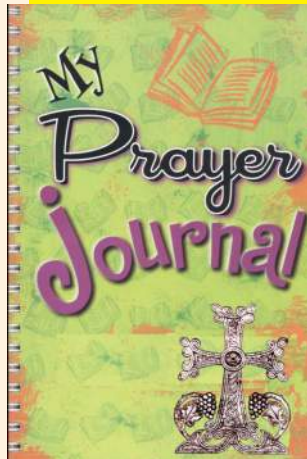

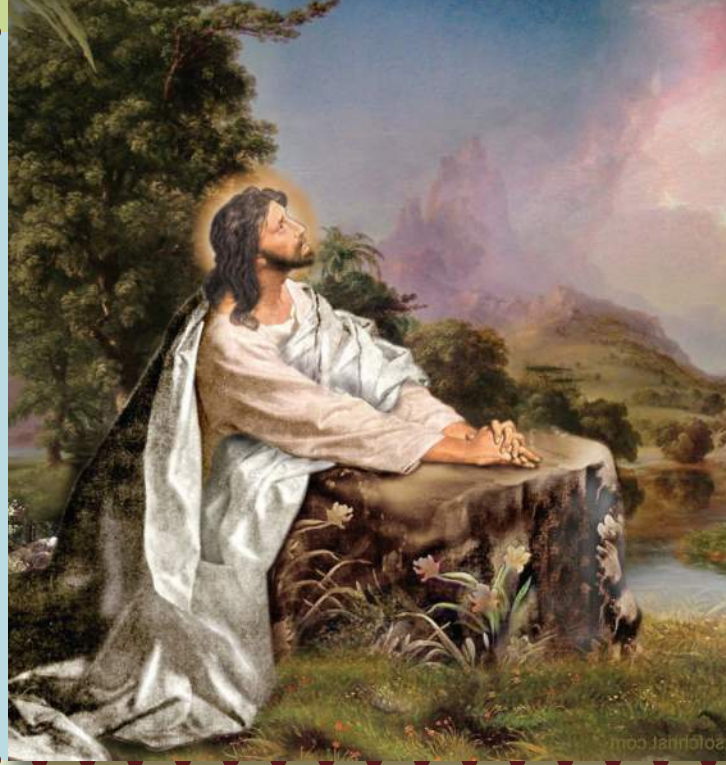

We Learn About God

Jesus was traveling all around Galilee, constantly preaching, teaching, and performing miracles. Just like Armen's mom in our story, Jesus was physically and spiritually tired and needed to be recharged. Our Scripture readings for this lesson teach us that Jesus prayed all the time and everywhere. This was his way to recharge. Jesus knew that it was important for him to spend time talking to God the Father for strength.

Jesus always led by example. Even though he was God's Son, he still prayed. We are called to do the same. In our Divine Liturgy, the deacons lead the worshippers in prayer asking the Lord to hear their prayers and bless everyone. The line that they repeat is "*Again in peace let us pray to the Lord.*" In many ways, just as Jesus led by example, the deacons are leading the worshippers by example in prayer.

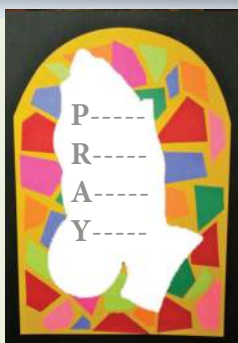
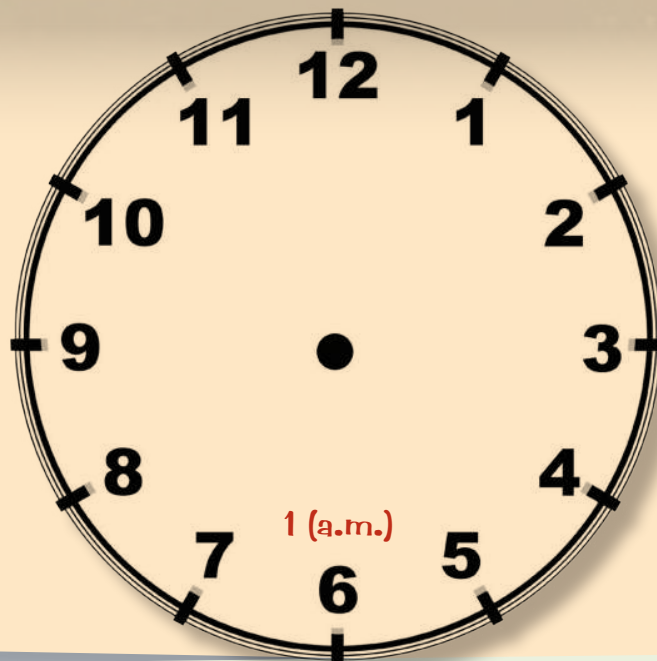

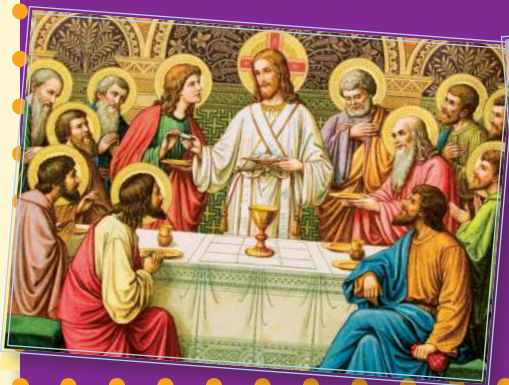
God’s Word

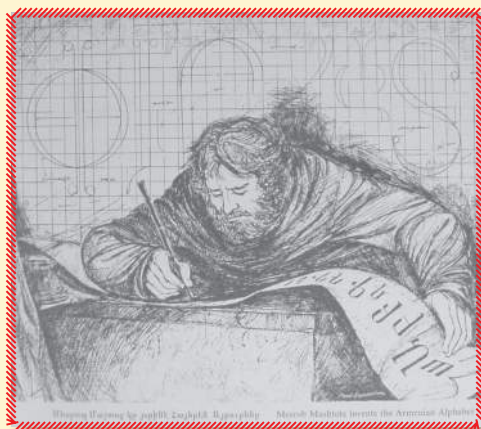

Jesus needed to pray to his Father as he was deeply troubled. He took Peter, James and John with him and asked that they wait and watch as he prayed. Jesus prayed to his Father saying, "Oh, my Father, if it is possible, let all of this suffering be taken away from me. But if I must suffer and die for the sins of the people, then let your will be done." Then Jesus went back and found Peter, James and John sleeping. "Couldn't you be with me for one hour? Watch and pray so you won't fall into sin." Then Jesus went back to pray two more times as the disciples continued to sleep. Jesus then woke them and prepared to leave.

Based on Matthew 26:17-35; Mark 14:32-42 and Luke 22:39-46



We Learn About God

Jesus knew that he was going to die on the cross. He knew that he was sent to earth for a reason, to take away sin and to give all of us a fresh, new start. This is why we have Holy Communion and remember the sacrifice of Jesus when we ask for forgiveness. But this did not mean that Jesus was not troubled. That is why he prayed to God the Father for courage and understanding.



St. Mesrob Mashdotz was the inventor of the Armenian Alphabet in 404 A.D. He also wrote beautiful musical prayers in the Armenian language. You will be hearing one of his prayers that seeks God's forgiveness. St. Mesrob refers to different people and stories from the New Testament. Some examples are the prodigal son, the tax collector, the thief on the cross next to Jesus. Listen to the prayer as your teacher reads it to you and see if any of the people mentioned sound familiar.

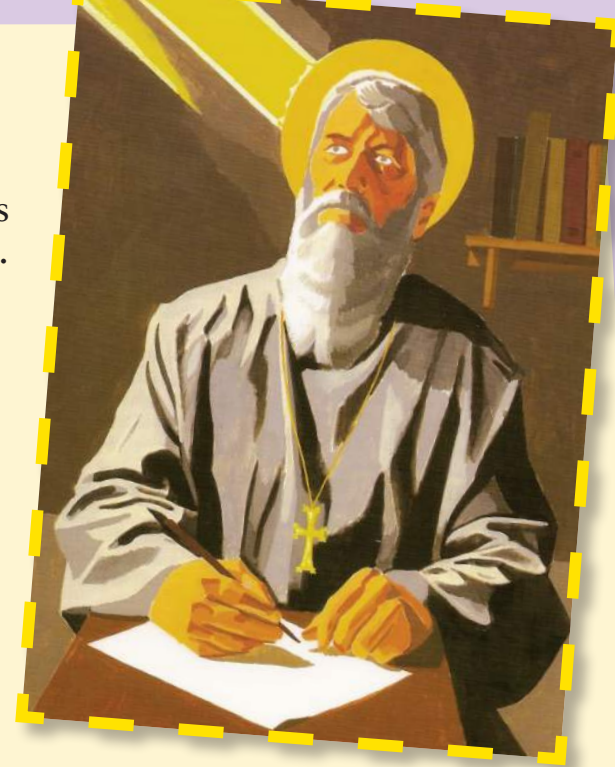
Our Armenian Way

St. Nersess the Gracefilled is one of the greatest writers of prayers, hymns and poems in the Armenian Church. Remember him from earlier lessons? His best known set of prayers is called “I Confess with Faith” which is read during the Lenten season. This prayer has 24 verses, one for each hour of the day. Each verse asks God to have mercy on us as we are sinners. In today’s lesson, you will be introduced to one of the most popular verses of this prayer, verse 11:

O, Jesus, Wisdom of the Father, grant me wisdom that I may always think, speak and do that which is good in your sight.

Save me from evil thoughts, words and deeds.

Have mercy upon all your creatures and upon me, a sinner.

We Learn About God

When we pray, we can express any feeling we have to God. God created our feelings and wants us to share openly and honestly with him. The Psalms are a good example of honest prayers.

The Book of Psalms is one of the greatest collection of prayers. It is the longest book of the Bible, containing 150 psalms. Almost half of the psalms were written by King David.



Our Armenian Way

In our Divine Liturgy, the deacon raises the chalice from the side altar and brings it to the holy altar. This very special entrance is called the Greater Entrance. Who is entering? Someone is coming. Who is coming? Jesus. A beautiful passage from Psalm 24:7-10 is read that tells us that the King of glory may enter the gates and we should be ready. The first line asks a question: “Who is this King of glory?” In Armenian, this line is: *Ov eh sa takavor paratz?*

Sharing Our Faith

In today's lesson, the students read *The Giving Tree* and learned that gratitude is essential to a good life. The Scripture passage for this lesson taught the students about putting God and gratitude at the center of everything they say and do. Thankfulness is deeply engrained in Armenian Church traditions; the children learned the thanksgiving hymn “Kohanamk” and the prayer before meals, *Jashagestzook*. The students made a keepsake *Jashagestzook* placemat.

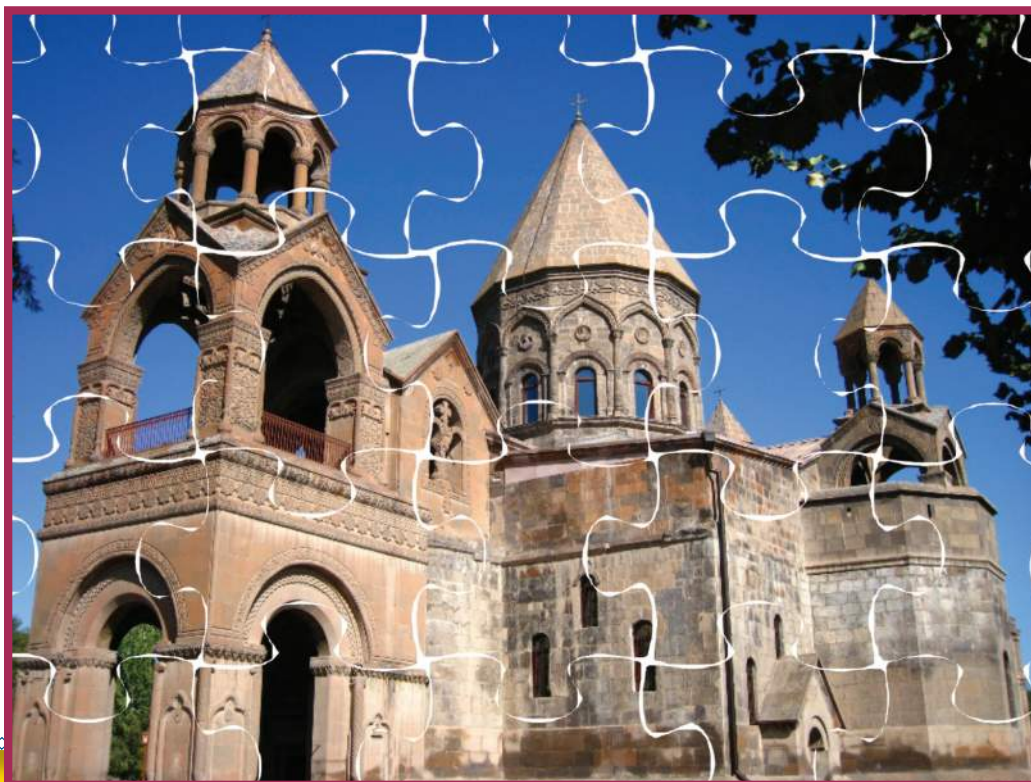

Class: Not really...

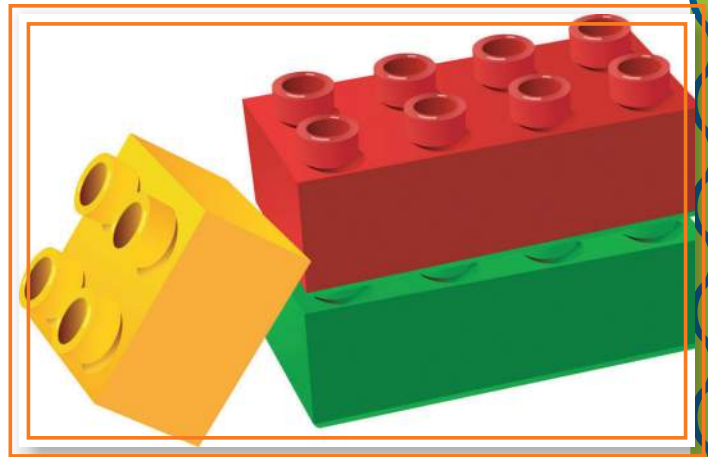
Teacher: But, it's still an important piece.

Teacher: Well, (holding up a piece) by itself, this piece doesn't do all that much. Just like one person in church.

Aren: Exactly, that's what I'm saying!

Teacher: (spread out all of the pieces of the Legos). You see, think of this piece as you, Aren, and this piece as John, and this piece as Ani and so on! All of us together become the church at Badarak. Or think of it this way, about the whole church family – this piece could be the choir, and this piece the Sunday School, and this piece the women's group, and this piece the youth, and this piece the Parish Council and so on. Each of these pieces, are important but they can't do much by themselves. When we start putting the pieces together, like this house I made, it becomes something really special and important. This is the same for our church. Each one of the pieces has a role, they need to come together and make up a church. This is how God designed it to be.



Aren: So, are you saying that each of us is important? Our church would not be complete without us?

Teacher: Exactly, without all of you, our church would be missing an important piece. Our church is made up of many, many important parts, and it's only when we come together that we have our completed church.

Aren: Mrs. Ohanian, I don't mean to rush you, but I think we should get going; we don't want to be late for church. We wouldn't want to keep everyone waiting for us; we have a job to do!

Teacher: You are absolutely right, Aren. Come on class, let's line up.

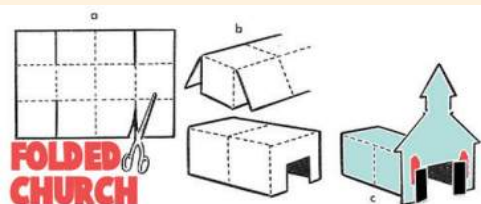
Our church is made up of many members. Each and every one of us has a part, a job, a purpose, and a place to fit in our church, just like in the story that we read.

Our Armenian Way

Our Soorp Badarak or Divine Liturgy is a perfect example of how we are one body in Christ. Our church is not a church without the people. One person cannot do everything. Our priest cannot celebrate Badarak without the choir, altar servers, and, of course, you. When we are together on Sundays, we become – as a group, as a body – the Church. We cannot do this on our own. When we share the Kiss of Peace, we sing: “The Church has become one soul!”

The place where the faithful sit in our church is called the nave. In Armenian, we say *nahv*. It actually comes from the Latin word for ‘boat’ (and also brings us the English word “navy”). Amazingly, *nahv* also means boat in Armenian! The idea is that we are all traveling together in a boat with lots of people, and our captain is... can you guess? Jesus.

those who speak in unknown languages.

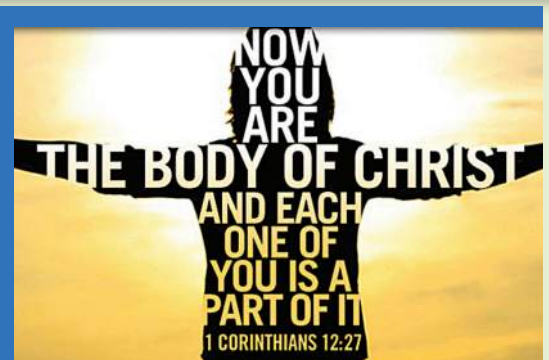

We Learn About God

Remember, *the church is not just a building, it's the people!* Jesus taught people to see how special it was to pray and worship together; in this way they became the true Church. St. Paul described it as something like a human body. There are so many different parts to our bodies. But all of them are important – the eye, the ear, the hands, the feet – everything makes it possible for us to function well. Like the parts of the body, we all bring something special to our community. God has given us gifts. Some of us are good teachers; some of us can heal people's feelings with warm words; some of us are great leaders. *Everyone* has some gift to offer to building up the church.



Our Armenian Way

Early Christians met in each other's homes. Their homes were their church. The home was a special place to share ideas, traditions, community, eating together, learning and prayer.

For Armenians and the Armenian Church, the home was so important that the church has a special blessing for the home. The home can be blessed at Christmastime, Easter, or even when moving to a new home. In the "Home Blessing," the priest asks for God's blessing and protection for the family. An Armenian home blessing requires three main ingredients from the family: a cup of water, a dish of salt, and a piece of bread.

- Bread reminds us of Jesus Christ who is the bread of life. Bread is also a very basic food and we need food to live.
- Water reminds us of our baptism. Water is also the most important element for all living things.
- Salt is a seasoning. Jesus called us the salt of the earth. But he reminded us that salt needs to be flavorful to do its job.

During the blessing, all who are gathered sing "Amen, Alleluia!" Alleluia is a word of praise and rejoicing. Amen Ամէն

One of Jesus' disciples, Judas, met with the high priests and made a deal with them to betray Jesus in exchange for money.

A few days later, it was time for the Jewish Passover Feast and the disciples wanted to know where Jesus wanted to have the Passover meal. Jesus directed his disciples to arrange for a special upper room for their meal. Normally, the Passover feast was a happy celebration, filled with laughter and joy. This particular Passover was going to be different for Jesus and his disciples. As they sat around the table, Jesus looked at his disciples and said he would be leaving them soon. It would be like a shepherd leaving his sheep.

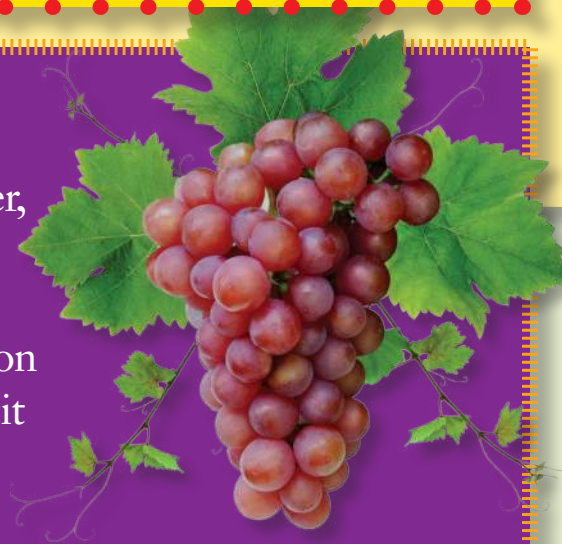
Jesus said, "One of you will betray me tonight." They were all surprised, including Judas, by what Jesus was saying. They said: "We will never betray you." Jesus turned to Peter and said "Before the rooster crows tomorrow morning, you will say three times that you never knew me." Peter said, "I would never say I don't know you; I would die with you!"

Then Jesus took the bread on the table and gave thanks to God. He broke it very slowly, saying, "Take, eat, this is my body, which is given for you." The disciples were puzzled as they didn't quite understand what was going on. Then Jesus took the cup of wine and gave thanks to God. He said, "This is my blood, poured out for the forgiveness of your sins. All of you must drink from this cup. Remember me by always doing this." After they shared the bread and the wine, they all sang a hymn and went to the Mount of Olives to pray.

We Learn About God

The Scripture reading for today describes the Last Supper, which was the first Holy Communion. Each Sunday, we all gather in our churches to celebrate the Divine Liturgy and we reenact this very holy meal. In preparation for Holy Communion, the priest prays for the Holy Spirit to come down upon the bread and wine. In this way, they truly become Jesus himself. Jesus is with us as our Bread of Life. This is why 'Divine Liturgy' means "holy sacrifice." Jesus is the sacrifice. The day after the Last Supper, Jesus died on the cross for all of our sins. Jesus gives himself to us in Holy Communion so that we may grow as children of God and become more like him.

“Take, _____; this is my _____, which is given for you and for many, for the forgiveness of your _____.”

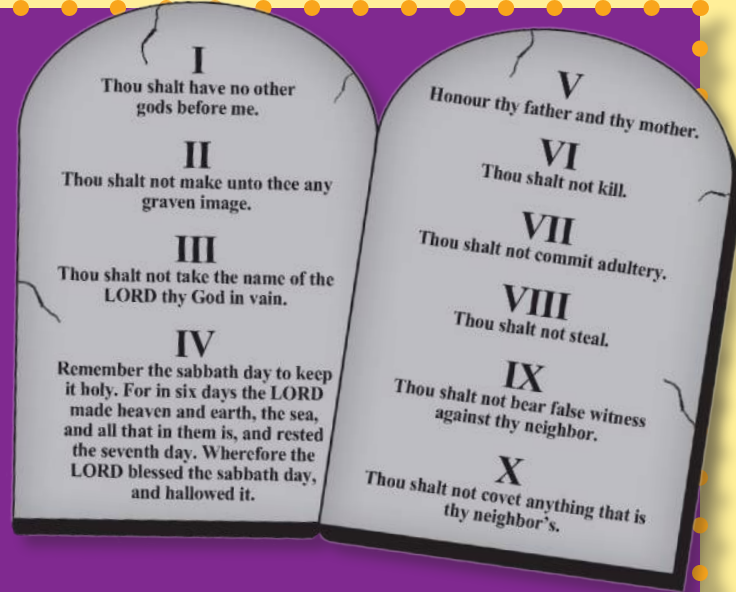

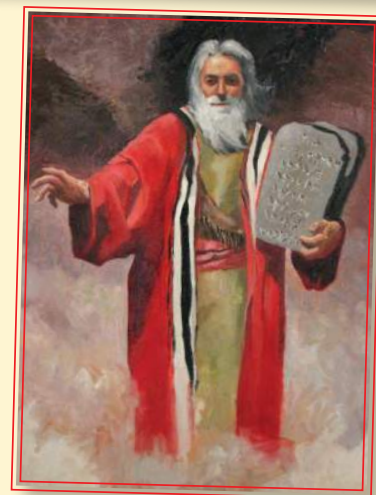

The mahs is blessed by the priest. The actual word “mahs” means a fraction or a portion. Mahs, just like the nushkhar, is made of water and flour. A nice custom to follow is to take some to those who are ill, or in the hospital as a sign of fellowship and being part of God’s family. By sharing the mahs, we are sharing God’s love with one another.

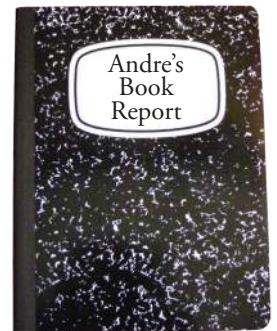

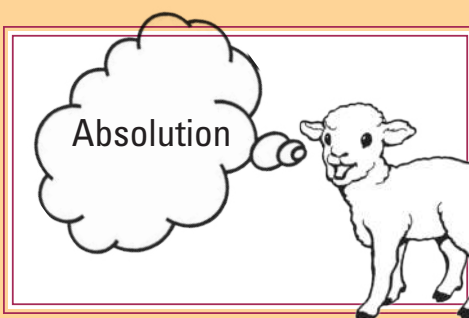

Our Armenian Way

In the Armenian Church, we have a special way of reconciling with God during Divine Liturgy. We gather as a group for confession before the altar. During confession, we read the confession words telling God our sins, stating that we have sinned against God, “Megha Asdoozo,” and asking for forgiveness. After the confession, the priest grants us absolution, which means God’s forgiveness. Then we all stand and one by one go toward the altar, make the sign of the cross, say “Megha Asdoozo” (I have sinned against God), receive Holy Communion and cross ourselves again.

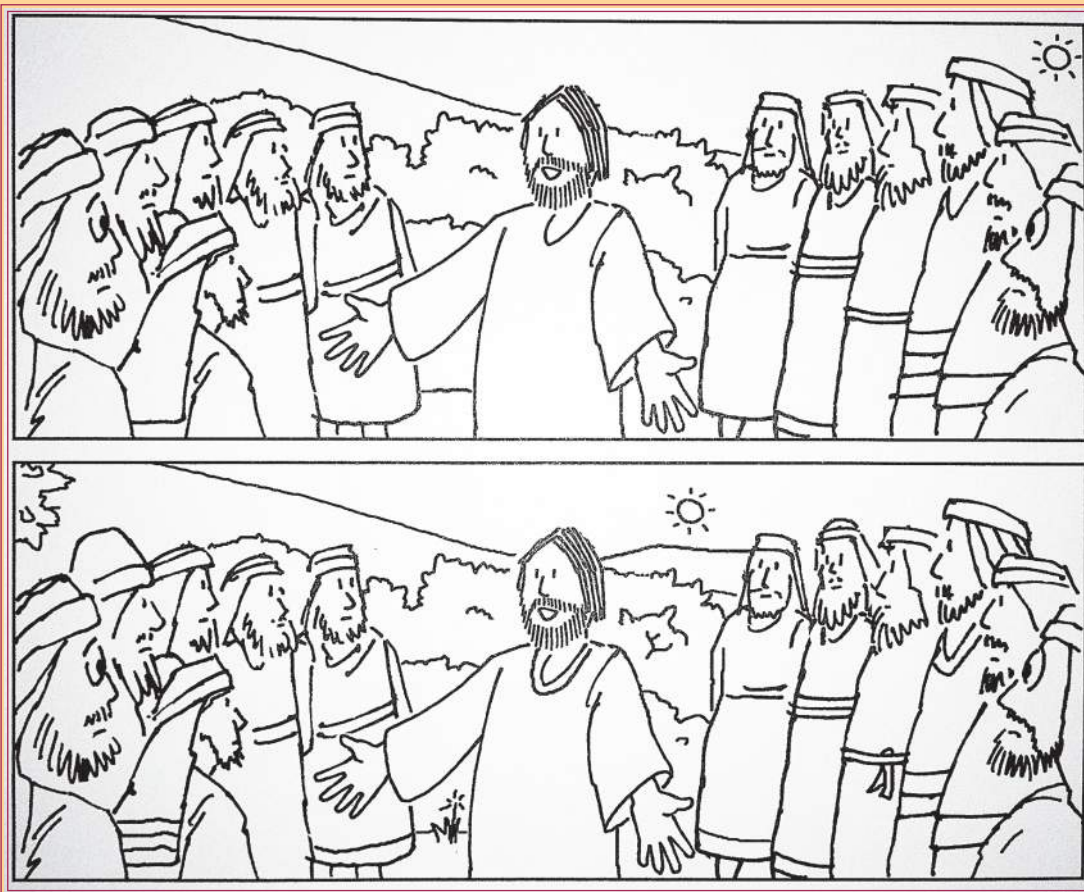

Each month, Aram and Emma's Sunday School class would go into church for Holy Communion. Their teacher, Mrs. Mesrobian, would always invite the parents. After several months, Aram and Emma noticed that some of the parents chose to stay in their seats and not receive Holy Communion.

One Sunday, Aram raised his hand and asked, "Why doesn't everyone in church go up for Holy Communion?" "Won't God get upset?" asked Emma. Mrs. Mesrobian liked the questions and gave the following example as an answer.

"Have you ever been invited to somebody's house for dinner? People go to a lot of trouble to welcome their guests. They clean their house, they set the table and they prepare delicious foods. 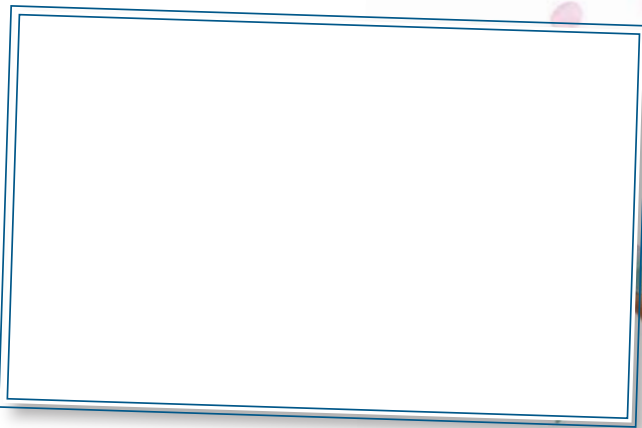

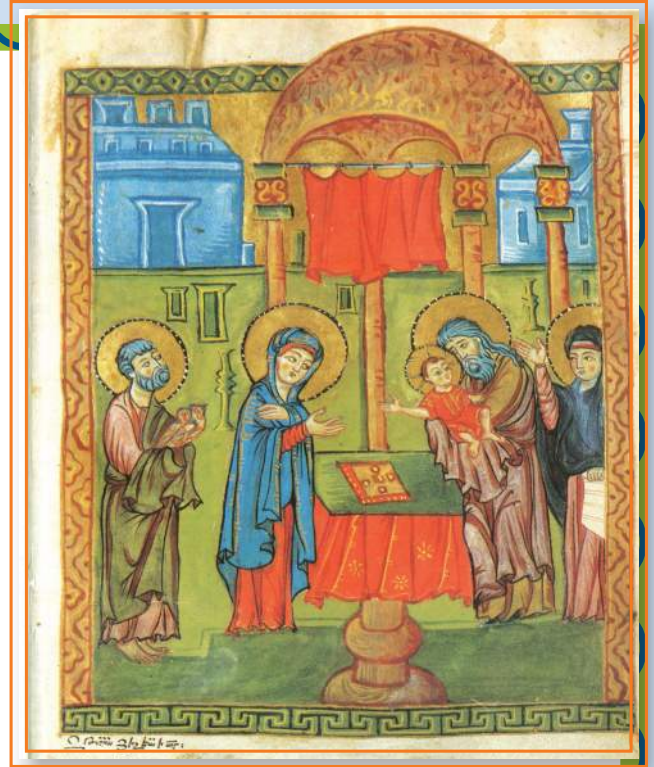
Տեանընդառաջ *Dyarnuntarach*

Paul Kevorkian was very excited because he just became a big brother. His mom had a baby boy, Narek, last month. Narek did a lot of the same things each day: eat, sleep, and have lots of diaper changes. Paul liked to hold Narek and would often look at him and dream of the time when Narek would play soccer or build towers out of building blocks with him.

On one Saturday, Mrs. Kevorkian was baking cookies when Paul asked, “When are we going to take Narek places? The only place he goes to is Dr. Jensen’s office for his baby check-ups. Can he come with me to Vasken’s house on Friday?” His mom smiled and said, “Actually, tomorrow we will take Narek out for the first time. We will take him to church for a special blessing by Der Hayr. In the Armenian Church, we have a custom that the first place a baby visits is the church, 40 days after they are born. Afterwards, we will host the refreshment hour in honor of Narek’s birth. That’s why I am baking the cookies. We did the same for you.”

“Why the church and why 40 days?” Paul asked.

“Well, you see, we celebrate Jesus’ birthday on January 6th and 40 days later, February 14th, we remember when his parents, Joseph and Mary, took Jesus and presented him to God at the temple. The elderly priest, Simeon, had prayed for many years that he would be blessed to see the Lord, Jesus. When he saw baby Jesus, he knew that this was God’s Son, the Savior, the light of the world. We call this event from Jesus’ life, his “Presentation” or, in Armenian, *Dyarnuntarach*, which is a feast day of our church. Although tomorrow is not *Dyarnuntarach*, it is the day that we will present baby Narek to the church.” Paul liked the plan and helped his mom with the cookies while practicing to say *Dyarnuntarach*.

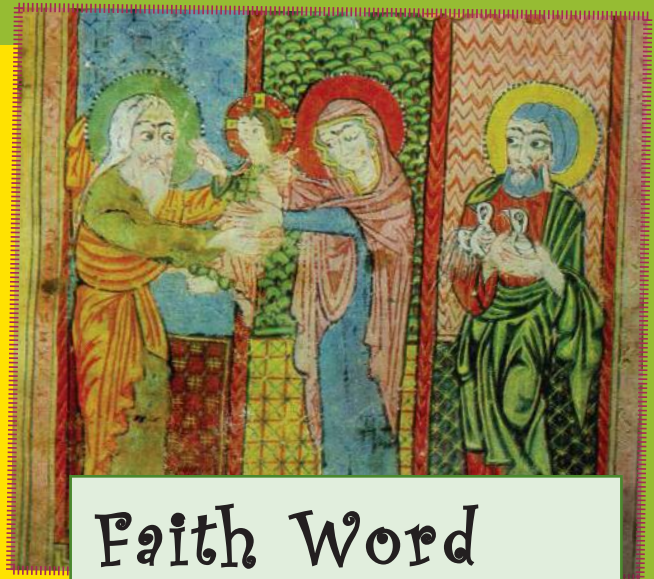

We Learn About God

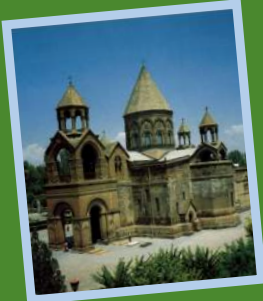
Jesus is the basis for all of the feasts and celebrations in our church. Our Scripture reading for today reminds us that at the Last Supper, which was the very first Holy Communion, Jesus told his disciples to always remember him.

A feast is a special celebration in the church. It reminds us of something that happened long ago or of a saintly person. It is a happy day as we become closer to God and to one another. The church has feast day celebrations throughout the year. Each feast day celebration has its own set of special hymns and prayers that are dedicated to that feast.

Our Armenian Way

The seasons of the Armenian Church recall the life of Jesus Christ and all the people and events that are part of his story through time. stepmother and two stepsisters.” Then Mrs.

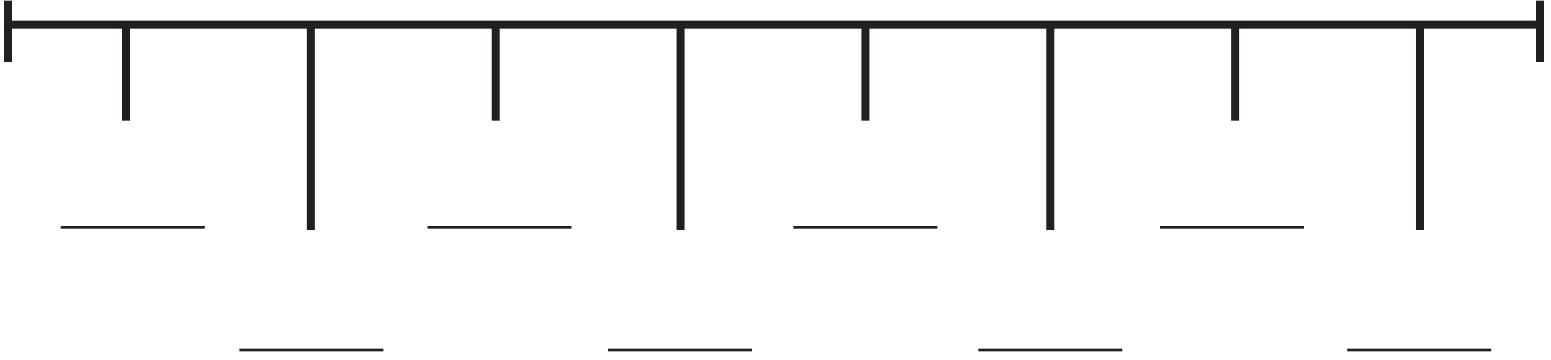

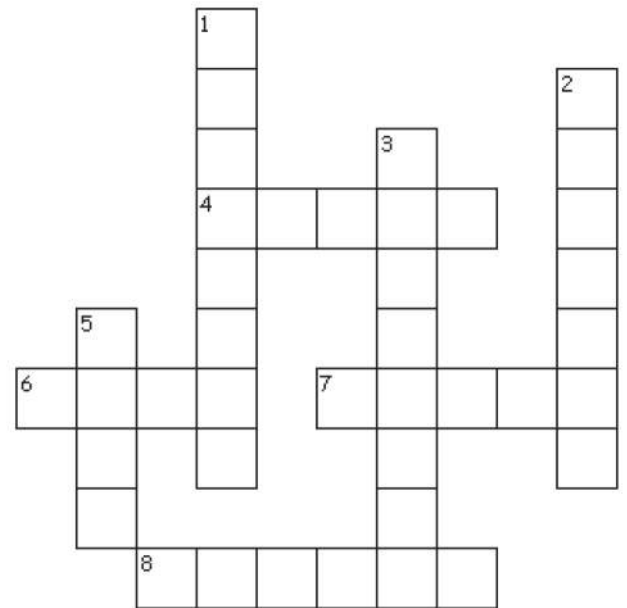

On this day, two very important events are remembered, the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem and the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River. At the end of the Armenian Christmas Divine Liturgy, a special service called “Blessing of Water,” *Chrorhnek* in Armenian, is conducted to remember Jesus’ baptism. All the faithful receive blessed water at the end of the service. During this joyous season, the faithful will turn to each other and greet one another with the following Christmas Greeting:

Our Armenian Way

Easter (in Armenian we say *Soorp Zadig*), is a very important time for the Church. It is the greatest feast of the year! Almost every day during the week before Easter (called Holy Week), families are in church together, remembering Jesus' last days and last words. At the Last Supper, he shared bread and wine with his disciples. This is why we receive Holy Communion every Sunday to this day. He also washed their feet, telling them that they came to serve others, not to be served. We remember these two events on Holy Thursday.



There are special traditions from long ago that still take place in many of our homes: baking Easter bread, serving fish, rice with raisins and dried fruit, and fried greens with eggs and, of course, the egg-cracking contest. Everyone selects a hard boiled egg, goes around the table, tapping each other's eggs. If your shell cracks, then you lost. The last one still uncracked is declared the winner.

The egg is a symbol of life. In the olden days, there were no food coloring or Easter egg kits, so people used onion skins. The onion skins give a rich brownish-red color which reminds us of Jesus' blood. The shell reminds us of Jesus' tomb, and when we crack the eggs, the egg white reminds us of the cloth that wrapped Jesus' body and the yolk is the "heart" of the egg just as Jesus is the heart of our faith. There is a special Easter greeting also said at this time of year:

During the forty days after Jesus rose from the dead, he gave very important instructions to his disciples. One day near the town of Bethany, Jesus spoke to them about God's kingdom, saying to wait in Jerusalem until God the Father sent the Holy Spirit as promised. Jesus also told his disciples that once they received the Holy Spirit they were going to tell the whole world about Jesus. The disciples would be Jesus' special messengers. We Learn About God



Forty days after Easter, the resurrection of Jesus, the church remembers and celebrates the feast of Ascension. This feast day falls on a Thursday and has a special Divine Liturgy and hymn. Ascension is very important because it marks the last event of Jesus' life and ministry on earth.

Our Armenian Way

Hampartsoom is a very special feast of the Armenian people. It is not only celebrated in the church but also through festivals, songs, dance, and games. Nature was very important during Hampartsoom as the Armenians believed that on the eve of Ascension, the sky would turn extra bright and that all of nature would be in celebration. Much of the fun and excitement was directed toward the youth, especially the young girls. One such tradition is a game called *vijagakhagh*. On the morning before Ascension Thursday, the young girls would gather flowers from seven different homes. Then, that evening the girls would take a pail and travel to seven homes or seven fountains and fill it with water. The flowers would be added to the same pail.



Each girl playing the game would also bring a small object (*nishan*) of theirs such as a ring or bracelet and place it in the pail. The pail would be placed outside, overnight under the stars with the hope that the stars would grant the wishes of the girls. On Hampartsoom Day, Ascension Thursday, the girls playing the vijag game would go on picnic. One of the girls, usually the oldest, would dress up as a bride. Vijag songs and poems would be sung. After each song or poem, the bride would select an object from the pail. The verse or song would be about the owner of that object. One of the most popular songs sung during the Hampartsoom vijag is *Hampartsoom Yaylah*.

Jesus' disciples were praying together in the upper room. All of a sudden a noise like a strong wind filled the room. The disciples were surprised as they saw tongues of fire appear on each of them. At that moment, they were speaking different languages that they did not know. The people of Jerusalem heard all of the noise and wanted to see what was happening. Everyone was shocked and asked them how they learned to speak these languages. Peter said that all of these events were part of God's plan. God sent his Son Jesus to save his people from sin. As promised, God sent the Holy Spirit to give the disciples the ability to spread the message of God. Peter then told the people that they should seek forgiveness from Jesus and be baptized. That day, over 3000 people were baptized by the disciples and became Christians. It was the birthday of the Church.

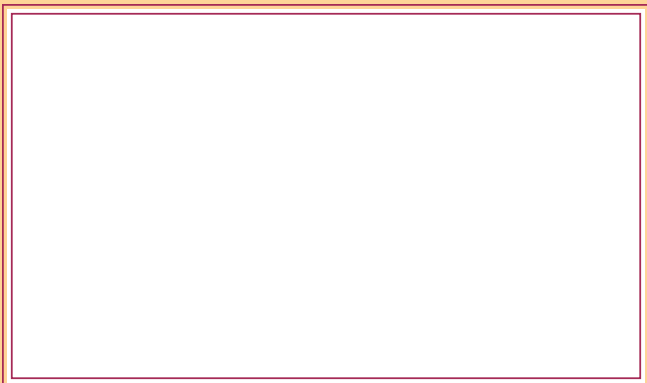
Our Armenian Way

Pentecost is a very important feast day of the Armenian Church. One of our Church Fathers, St. Movses Khorenatsi, wrote the main hymn of *Hokekaloost* called *Arakelo Aghavno*. The title means the “dove being sent.” The hymn is not only sung on the feast of Pentecost but also during the Blessing of the Water service, Baptism, and Ordination, which are times when Holy Muron is used. The English translation of the hymn is the following:

With a mighty sound from above, the Dove came down like a bright light and armed the Apostles with a fire that could not burn them as they sat in the Upper Room.

The disciples knew that they heard the voice of God and bowed down. When they opened their eyes, Jesus was alone. Our Armenian Way



Every summer, Armenians look forward to celebrating the Feast of Transfiguration, *Aylagerbootyoon* in Armenian (also known as *Vartavar*).

This feast is celebrated on the 14th Sunday after Easter. Originally, *Vartavar* was an ancient festival for the goddess Astghig. *Vart* means rose in Armenian. People would decorate the temples and farm animals with roses and sprinkle one another with water. The sprinkling of water is still done and people sometimes decorate the church with roses. At the end of the Badarak in some churches, the priest places his hand cross in water, and sprinkles all the faithful during the final procession.

If you happen to be in Armenia on the Feast of the Transfiguration, don't be surprised if you are splashed with a bucket of water — another *Vartavar* favorite tradition. Like other Armenian feast days, those people with names such as Vartkes, Vartouhie, Nevart, Rose, or Vartanoush enjoy their name day celebration.

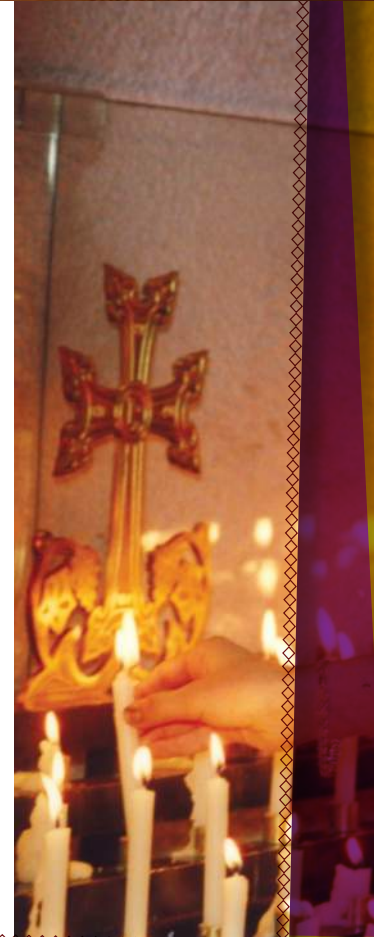

Our Story

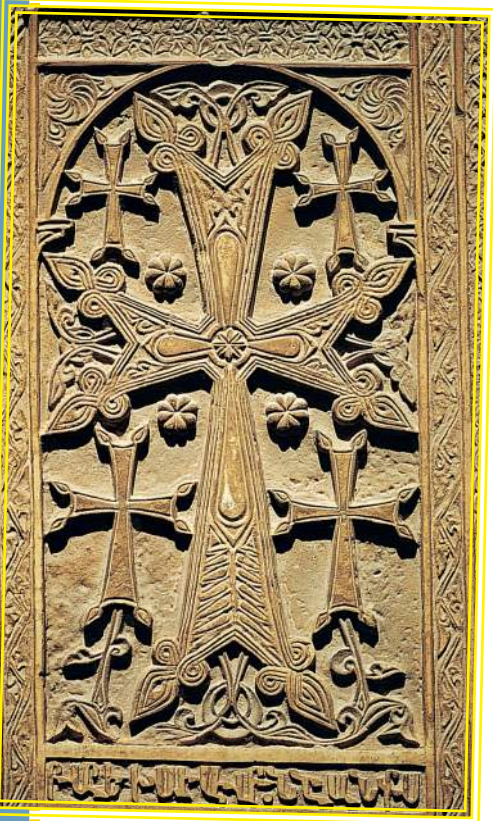
Chris was so thrilled when his parents told him about their upcoming trip to Armenia. He was very excited to see everything that he had read about in Sunday School. He couldn't wait to see Mt. Ararat, Etchmiadzin, St. Gregory's Pit (Khor Virab), and to hear Armenian spoken wherever he went. And of course the delicious food and music would be a treat!



As they were touring Armenia, Chris saw many, many old and beautiful churches. Chris also noticed many stones with fancy cross carvings. They were everywhere, at the museums, parks, churches and open fields. Chris asked Masis, their tour guide, "What are all those stones with crosses called?"

"Oh, those are called khachkars. A khach is a cross like the one around your neck and "kar" means stone. These khachkars are unique, because Armenians are the only people to make them in this way. The cross is a very important symbol for all of us, it is a sign of our faith in Jesus Christ." "Wow! That's so cool!" said Chris. Masis then told the family, "On Sunday, we are going to Etchmiadzin and participate in the Feast Day celebration called the Exaltation of the Holy Cross or *Khachveratz*. A

special procession is led by the priest with the cross that is decorated with basil, a symbol of royalty. During the procession, the four corners of the church are blessed. You are all fortunate to be here during this joyous feast day. Each of you will receive some blessed basil to take with you." Chris and his parents agreed that this was definitely the trip of a lifetime!

Our Armenian Way

The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross is always celebrated on the Sunday closest to September 14th. There were some important times when the cross of Jesus was raised up and honored. One that we remember on the Exaltation is when, many hundreds of years ago, the True Cross was brought through Armenia on its way back to Jerusalem and exalted before the happy crowds. On the Feast Day, the cross is held high in a procession through the church. The priest and deacons stop at each of the four corners of the church to perform a blessing. The special service and procession is called in Armenian "antasdan" which can be done at other times of the year as well.
