## My Sunday School Lesson Plan - Younger Grades **Books of Thessalonians 1 and 2**

DATE: <u>January 19, 2019</u>

Preparation:	Bibles to use in class

Lesson Title:	The New Testament Book of Thessalonians Continue your NEW Testament Wall display by hanging the "Thessalonians 1 & 2" wall cards.			
Scripture Reference(s):	1 Thessalonians 1:7-8 "so that you became an example to all the believers in Macedonia and in Achaia. For the word of the Lord has sounded forth from you "			
	2 Thessalonians 3:13 "Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right" (Message: Work hard to please God.)			
Emphasis or Theme:	We Work Hard to Please God Until Jesus Returns			
Introducing the Story: (What you might say or do before the story to help create an interest or curiosity.)	(Hang your "Thessalonians 1 & 2" wall cards on your New Testament wall display.) <b>BEFORE CLASS:</b> Place at the front of the room items for different occupations such as a calculator, tool belt, apron, hammer, iPad, etc.			
	SAY: The Books of 1 Thessalonians and 2 Thessalonians are 2 more letters written by apostle Paul.  Thessalonians 1: The church in the city of Thessalonica was growing. The members were loving one another, standing firm in their beliefs, and holding up under persecution for their faith. Paul is overjoyed to hear this! He writes the Thessalonians one of his most positive letters to encourage them. He commends them for their excellent example and goes on to list ways that they can "excel still more" until Jesus returns.  Thessalonians 2: The world just won't let up! The poor Thessalonians were having problems from unbelievers, so Paul writes a second letter encouraging to keep growing in faith and love, and to "work hard" until Jesus' return.			
LESSON: Telling the Story Through the Bible: (Outline the story here. Then describe the method you will use to tell the story. Examples might include showing pictures, props, visuals, drawing as you tell, using puppets, costumed characters, dramatic storytelling or any number of other methods.)	SAY: I brought some things today that people use in their work. Here's a (show and explain each item – ask what type of job might use this item).  ASK: How many of you already have a job where you get a paycheck? Not too many of you, right? What are some of the jobs that the adults you know have?  SAY: The grownups in your life work hard every day to take care of you. They work to make sure you have a place to live and food to eat.  SAY: I can remember one of my first jobs. (Tell what you did.)  ASK: What job do you want to have when you are a grown up? (Pause for responses)  ASK: What are some of the jobs you have at your home?  SAY: It isn't always easy to work, and sometimes we can be lazy. But God wants us to work hard, because one day Jesus will return, and we should be ready for that great			

day! We should work hard on doing good things for others, like helping around our homes, sharing, and listening to the grownups in our lives. When we work hard like this, we are helping our families keep our homes running happily and nicely! SAY: Let's think about some of the jobs that people do around our church. (Name people and tell what they do. Then ask the following question for up to three people.) **ASK:** What would happen if (name of person) didn't do the job of (name of job)? **SAY:** Well, we can see that if all these people did not work hard around our church. things would get messy, disorganized, and confusing. **SAY:** The Bible tells us that it's a good thing that all these people work hard. And the Bible tells us that God wants us to work hard, too. **READ: 2 Thessalonians 3:11-12:** "For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work guietly and to earn their own living." **SAY:** Paul wrote that there are some people who refuse to work. They do nothing. And they busy themselves in other people's lives. Paul commands, in the name of Jesus, that those people to work quietly and earn money to pay for their own food and clothing. **SAY:** Wow! This is pretty serious! God says that we need to do our work quietly—that means without complaining or arguing. Let's remember not to complain or argue this week when we work at home to help our families. **SAY:** The Bible also teaches us to never become tired of doing good. Because it is when we are doing good for others that we are wide awake and full of energy! **Learning Activities:** 1. 'Keeping Watch' Wristwatch craft 2. 'Time for Jesus' Wristwatch craft (Games, crafts artwork, songs, 3. Get to Work Construction Cone activity – do this as a class with younger students memory verses, or other activities that bring fuller meaning to the scripture or make application to the lives of the students.) Review: 1. The Books of Thessalonians were written by which apostle? PAUL (Solidify learning by repeating facts, 2. How many books of Thessalonians did Paul write? 2 3. Who are some people who work hard in our church? (Answers from earlier) themes, or even the story itself through games, crafts, activities, or 4. Why is is important to work hard? The Bible teaches us to work hard; one day Jesus will return, etc. visual aides.)
