My Sunday School Lesson Plan - Older Grades **Books of Timothy 1 and 2**DATE: January 26, 2019

Preparation:	Bibles to use in class
(What I need to do and items to gather before I begin to teach.)	White board or Poster paper

Lesson Title:	The New Testament Books of Timothy 1 and Timothy 2 Continue your NEW Testament Wall display by hanging the "Timothy 1 & 2" wall cards.
Scripture Reference(s):	1 Timothy 1:18 "I am giving you these instructions, Timothy, my child, in accordance with the prophecies made earlier about you, so that by following them you may fight the good fight," 2 Timothy 1:13 "Retain the standard of sound words which you have heard from me,
	in the faith and love which are in Christ Jesus.
Emphasis or Theme:	The Pastor's Guide to Sound Teaching and Godliness – Carrying on the Ministry of Jesus!
Introducing the Story: (What you might say or do before the story to help create an interest or	BEFORE CLASS: Draw on white board or Poster paper a large "Help Wanted" sign. (Hang your "Timothy 1 & 2" wall cards on your New Testament wall display.)
curiosity.)	SAY : The last several books we have been studying, (<i>Romans, Corinthians refer to your wall cards!</i>) have been letters written by apostle Paul to a group of people. But the Books of 1 Timothy and 2 Timothy are letters written by Paul to a specific person – a very young man named Timothy.
LESSON:	ASK: Does anyone know what a "protégé" is? (Pause for responses.)
Telling the Story Through the Bible: (Outline the story here. Then describe the method you will use to tell the story. Examples might include showing pictures, props, visuals, drawing as you tell, using puppets, costumed characters, dramatic storytelling or any number of other methods.)	SAY: A protégé is a person who is guided and supported by an older and more experienced or influential person. For example, if a mechanic wants to teach a younger person how to fix cars, he might find a "protégé" to teach him/her what he knows.
	SAY: Timothy was Paul's protégé. Timothy was a young pastor (church priest), and Paul left him to lead the church. His job was to steer the people away from false teachings, be an example of Godliness, and Carry on the Ministry of Jesus. His job was to be a church priest!
	ASK : If we were going to place an ad in the newspaper for a "Church Priest," what do you think it would say? What are some of the qualifications for a person to become a church priest? (On board, make a "Help Wanted" sign for a church priest and brainstorm/list on students' responses for what qualifications are needed.)
	ASK : Have you ever wondered how our priest, Father, learned how to become a priest? Who taught him how to perform the Diving Liturgy? How he learned how to give Communion? Or knew how to teach others about living a Godly life? (<i>Pause for responses.</i>)
	SAY : Paul's letter to Timothy was written for all church leaders with specific instructions on how to be a church leader. Being a church priest can definitely be a struggle at times, but the reward of showing others God's way makes any difficulty seem small. Paul calls this "fighting the good fight" and shows them how.

This book gives us a look at Paul's 2 main instructions on how to overcome the challenges that Timothy was facing - challenges many pastors still face today: His 2 main instructions are:

- 1. What Christians should or should not teach. To maintain sound teaching by using the scriptures and focusing on the gifts from God.
- 2. Behave in a Godly way from family to money, from prayer to church leadership Paul explains how to handle these things in a godly way.

Behaving and acting in a godly way 24-7 is a true challenge, but Paul's letter gives instructions to young church leaders on how to do this and be a good example to others.

ASK: Do you think you could be a church leader? Why or why not?

SAY: Apostle Paul was certainly an excellent role model for young church leaders like Timothy. But by the time he writes his 2nd letter to Timothy, he is very old. Paul had devoted his life to spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ. He had fought for sound teaching in the churches. He had trained pastors. He had corrected individuals, churches, and even apostles. He had testified before kings. Now Paul's work was almost done, and he would soon leave the world behind. But he wasn't leaving the world without a representative for truth. Timothy, Paul's protégé, needed to carry on Paul's teachings. Here are the instructions that Paul gave to the young pastor:

- 1. Guard and fight for the gospel.
- 2. Pursue righteousness.
- 3. Continue in sound teaching.
- 4. Preach the word

The Books of Timothy 1 & 2 are wonderful letters of advice for church leaders and give instruction to those who want to live godly lives. We might call it a "Priest's Handbook for Good Teaching and Godliness!"

Learning Activities:

(Games, crafts artwork, songs, memory verses, or other activities that bring fuller meaning to the scripture or make application to the lives of the students.)

- 1. Fighting the Good Fight Gloves craft
- 2. Think it Through (problem solving) discussion
- 3. Problems Plus (teen problems) discussion

Review:

(Solidify learning by repeating facts, themes, or even the story itself through games, crafts, activities, or visual aides.)

- 1. The Books of Timothy were written by which apostle? PAUL
- 2. How many books of Timothy did Paul write? 2
- 3. Who was Timothy? Paul's protégé; a young church leader
- 4. In the Books of Timothy gives instructions on how to do what job? (Be a Church leader/Priest)
