

Taking a Closer Look

We have only ONE God. He has helped us understand him by showing himself to us in three ways: as Father, as Son, and as Holy Spirit. We know God the Father as creator of the universe. In the New Testament we get to know God the Son, Jesus Christ, friend,

teacher, and Savior. We also learn about God the Holy Spirit who is in us and with us always. We call the three persons of God the **Holy Trinity**.

Even after his resurrection he shared a meal with some travelers (Luke 24:13-35). At his last supper with his disciples, he wanted his followers to remember him. We call this event the **Lord's Supper**. We re-enact this most special meal Jesus shared with his followers. We do this today by receiving Holy Communion.

But who you are is not just your name. Who you are is shown by your behavior, your way of doing things, your attitude and personality. And who you are develops as you grow older.

Markers are like labels. They help us categorize, group, define and separate things. "Put all the blue pencils in this box and all the red ones in that box." "All the left-handed children line up here and the right-handed ones line up there." Some markers are obvious and very noticeable and some are not. Everyone would know you are Christian if you wear a cross necklace, wouldn't they? The cross is a marker.

Sometimes people are marked for something special. A good athlete might get special training to make the most of those skills. People sometimes show a talent for music from early childhood.

At your chrismation (one of the three sacraments of initiation) you were **marked** with holy oil as a Christian. **Marked for life**. What sort of life? A life that should show your relationship with Jesus Christ. A life that reflects the good things that Jesus wants you to do.

A **righteous** life. A **consecrated** life. CONSECRATED means set apart for God's use. RIGHTEOUS means doing what is right for God.


Getting Closer to God

Jesus' Presentation at the Temple (Luke 2:22-38)

Even Mary and Joseph wanted to mark baby Jesus as God's child. Eight days after his birth they made a special trip to the Temple. In those days the Jews had a ceremony for the firstborn baby boy to be presented to God. It was not like our sacraments of initiation, but similar in its meaning.

At the Temple, the holy family met two people who recognized Jesus as the Messiah (the one chosen by God). Simeon and Anna knew Jesus was God. They were overjoyed to be able to meet the Lord.

Our Armenian Way

In the Armenian Church, we joyfully remember Jesus' presentation to the Temple on the Feast of the Presentation or *Dyarnuntarach*. In some of our churches today, a special blessing is given connected with *Dyarnuntarach* called "The Blessing of Babies." It is usually done on the Sunday in February closest to the Feast of the Presentation (February 14) just before the Badarak ends. Babies who have been baptized in the year before are presented to God and rededicated to him. The service recalls the Presentation of Jesus. As he blesses the baby, the priest prays: "O Christ our God ... protect and keep your people and especially this child..."



Taking a Closer Look

In past centuries and even in Armenia today, Dyarnuntarach has quite a fun side. The people attend church and light candles which represent the light of Jesus. After church they use the candles to light a bonfire. People jump over the fire for good luck. The fire celebrates the end of winter and coming of spring.

FAMILY CORNER

Sharing Our Faith

Today, students learned about how special they are as God's children. In their baptism and chrismation, they were marked for a righteous life in God. In the prayer over the oil of the baptismal service, we hear that we are "anointed for holiness, for strength to keep the commandments that leads to virtue and service.... and for salvation." How wonderful! We also learned about the presentation of Jesus to the Temple by his parents (very much like the children's own anointing) and how we celebrate it in the Armenian Church. The children enjoyed a cupcake to celebrate their own birthdays.

Living Our Faith

1. Sit together and talk about what your child would like to inherit from his or her parents or siblings. Don't just think of things. Think of talents (mom's piano playing) and abilities (dad's joke telling), personality traits (the way my brother makes new friends so easily), objects that you value that they also value such as a favorite family photo.

2. Have your own "Family Awards" night. Decide what object will be awarded. For example, chocolate bars, computer-generated award sheets, fresh fruits, etc. Everyone's name should be written on a slip of paper and each person pulls a slip to present an award to the person whose name they got. (If someone pulls their own name they have to put it back and pull another.) Think of what you would give that person an award for. Now start the "Awards Ceremony." Each person should stand and say something like "The award for the person who (tell the category) goes to (name the person)" and present that person with the award object. For example "The award for the person who is the best family chauffeur goes to MOM!" and give mom an apple, "The award for best homework coach goes to DAD!" and give dad a plum. "In the category of best bed maker, the award goes to TOMMY!" and give him an orange.

One of the things Jesus is best known for is performing miracles.


What is a miracle? Is it like magic?

A miracle is when God makes something happen that could not happen in any natural way. Magic is a clever trick that fools people into believing what they think they see.

A miracle is God's ability to change what we think of as normal into what is better. Jesus performed miracles to glorify his Father and fulfill the Old Testament prophecies.

Taking a Closer Look

Why did these miracles happen?

Because Jesus wanted to share the greatness and glory of God through miracles. Jesus is God and with God nothing is impossible. God made the universe and he can change it as he pleases. God changed the normal to what he wanted, the "real" normal.

Questions and answers about miracles

Q. Why did Jesus perform miracles?

A. To give people a glimpse of God's glory, out of love for people who were suffering, and to fulfill the prophecies about him.

Q. Was Jesus the only person who performed miracles?

A. No. Many of Jesus' disciples performed miracles with Jesus' help.

Q. Can miracles happen now?

A. Yes, but we need to be looking to truly see the miracles God sends our way.

Q. Should we ask for a miracle such as when someone is hurt or sick and you want them to get well?

A. Yes. You can pray to God and ask him to change things to an outcome you would like. But remember, sometimes it will not happen for reasons we don't understand now.

Q. What is the final miracle we will experience ourselves?

A. Heaven. There we will be in the presence of God. There we will find complete peace and happiness.


Jesus' enemies even demanded a miracle from him. Read Matthew 12:38-40. The Pharisees are asking Jesus to perform a miracle. They don't really think he can do it. They think what Jesus does is a trick and they want to trap him. Jesus scolds them calling them evil and godless because he knows their purpose. So Jesus tells them the only miracle they will experience is one like the miracle the Prophet Jonah experienced. Jonah was in the belly of the big fish for three days and came out alive and well. Jesus was telling those

people who didn't believe in him that he would be buried for three days just like Jonah was in the fish for three days and then he would be out and okay. They would see the miracle of Jesus' Resurrection.

Our Armenian Way

A MIRACLE IN ARMENIA

When Jesus was in Jerusalem, the Armenian King Apkar ruled the kingdom whose capital was Edessa. Armenia was a land of many kingdoms at that time. King Apkar had heard of Jesus and his miracle healings and sent a messenger to Jesus asking if Jesus could come to Edessa and heal him. He suffered from a terrible disease. Jesus was unable to go there, but said he would send his disciple Thaddeus. After the death, resurrection, and ascension of our Lord, Thaddeus set out on his journey to King Apkar and healed him. The King had faith in Jesus and told others of Jesus' love and concern for him.

truly happy. He was and is a great teacher. Many times he spoke directly to people as a teacher. They called him *Rabbi* which means teacher.

Taking a Closer Look

Jesus spent as much time as he could teaching the people. He wanted them to know God and to love him. He often taught with stories. These were called "parables" and were simple stories about everyday life. And yet they always ended with important questions for us to think about. For example, Jesus taught a famous parable about mercy that we now call "The Parable of the Good Samaritan." It can be found in Luke 10: 25-37. God gave the Israelites rules to live by called the Ten Commandments. One day Jesus was asked, "Which commandment is the most important of all?"

GODS GUIDING WORDS

The Beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-10)



One special time Jesus taught has come to be called the Sermon on the Mount. People had gathered to hear him speak. One of the things he told them about is called The Beatitudes, a set of principles that teach us what we need to be happy: love, peace, justice, mercy, and generosity.

Jesus wants us to depend on him and said that when we live in his way, we are truly

happy. We are already with God in our hearts and already sharing in his Kingdom! This is the first lesson.

"God blesses those people who depend only on him. They belong to the kingdom of heaven."

You know that many people in your school, in this country, in this world do not live according to God's plan and there is meanness and hurtfulness. There is war, hunger, poverty and many other awful things. It makes you sad that these sinful things happen. Jesus said if you are saddened by sin, evil, and suffering in the world or if you are sad to have lost someone you love, you can depend on God to comfort you. God will give you ways to help and feel better. This is the second lesson.

"God blesses those people who grieve. They will find comfort!"

Children who only think of themselves don't have time to think of others. They don't want to think of others. But all God's children, including you, should think of others as your sisters and brothers and care for them. A person who puts the needs of others first is called *HUMBLE*. Humble people show gentleness and patience towards others. Another word for this kind of person is *MEEK*. Jesus said God loves this kind of person and will reward them. This is the third lesson.

"God blesses those people who are humble. The earth will belong to them."

"That's not fair!" is a phrase you have probably used when you think someone has been unjust towards you. It is a phrase God wants everyone to use if people are not being treated fairly. God wants you to stand up for your rights and the rights of others. When you get justice for yourself and others you will be happy. God wants things to be right. When you work for righteousness for all you are doing God's will. This is the fourth lesson.

"God blesses those people who want to help him make the world right even more than they want to eat or drink. They will be given what they want."

God wants you to be concerned about the feelings of others and show them the same loving kindness that you want for yourself. Jesus taught us this fifth lesson.

"God blesses those people who are merciful. They will be treated with mercy."

Jesus said that what you say and do should always be what is right with God. This is called being pure in heart. When you are pure in heart you see God guiding you. This is lesson six.



"God blesses those people whose hearts are pure. They will see him!"

God knows you can only be happy when you are at peace with yourself and others. Jesus was a peacemaker and he wants you to be peacemaker like him. This is the seventh lesson.

"God blesses those who make peace. They will be called his children."

Sometimes doing the right thing is very hard. You may lose a friend or an opportunity because you did what is right and good. You may feel hurt because others laugh at you when you do what you know is God's will. Jesus said to come to him in his kingdom and all things will be better there and you will be happy. This is lesson eight.

Our Armenian Way

A MIRACLE IN ARMENIA

Up until very recently, Armenians who came from the same town or village considered themselves part of the same family. If they came from the town of Marash, they were all "Marash-tzees." People from Palu were all Palu-tzees. The "tzee" ending in Armenian is just like some of the ways we refer in



English to people from the same place. Someone from New York is a New York-er. Someone from Wisconsin is a Wisconsin-ite.

But for Armenians, coming from the same town made for a strong bond. *Everyone* from that town was a true neighbor and friend. This was a great example of taking Jesus' command seriously by caring for *all* the people who occupy your world.

RESPONDING IN FAITH

One of the best things Jesus taught us is how to pray. He taught us what we call the Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6:9-14).

Here is a simple way to think about what the prayer says:

- Father of all of us, you who are in heaven, you are more special than anyone.
- I pray I always follow your ways.
- Give me what I need today to live the kind of life that pleases you.
- Forgive my wrongs as I forgive the wrongs done to me by others.
- Lead me away from sinful thoughts, words, and actions.
- Rescue me from evil things.
- I pray this for myself and for everyone for I want your blessings for me and for all.

Taking a Closer Look

God created the world and gave it to Adam and Eve to enjoy and care for. He put Adam and Eve in a paradise we call the Garden of Eden and told them they could eat all but the fruit of one tree, the "Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil."

There was another tree in the garden called the "Tree of Life." Adam and Eve could eat from that tree, but before they did, they were tempted by the devil in the form of a snake to eat the fruit of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, to disobey God.

That is what sin is, willfully disobeying God. Adam's and Eve's disobeying is called ORIGINAL SIN. When Adam



and Eve sinned, they were driven out of the Garden of Eden before they could eat from the Tree of Life. So now they would never be as naturally close to God as they were in the Garden. (There, they walked and talked with him!) And their lives would not go on forever, but would end.

You know that when you do something wrong, it is important to "make it right." You must recognize that you did something wrong, apologize, and make amends or pay what is owed – the debt. If you are playing baseball and hit a ball through your neighbor's window, you should go to the neighbor and say you did it, apologize, and pay to have the window fixed.

Even though Adam and Eve sinned, even though we sin, God still loves us. Jesus came to save us from the consequences of our sins, to pay our debt. The sin of Adam and Eve kept humankind from everlasting life. But Jesus fixed that. He died for all of us so that we could all live again with God in his Heavenly Paradise. Jesus saved us from death. Jesus sacrificed his life so that our life with God could continue.

Jesus is our SAVIOR.

We try to live obedient to Jesus' teachings. We pray that we will follow God's will and not choose to turn away from how he wants us to live.

Our Armenian Way

Have you ever noticed that the Armenian Church doesn't have many pictures or statues of Jesus crucified on the cross? That is because we in the Armenian Church focus on his resurrection! In the Armenian Church we use "empty" crosses, many with a radiance like sunlight coming from them. Our crosses show that Jesus has risen and gone ahead to heaven to prepare a place for us. He paid for our entrance into heaven with his life. He has NEW LIFE now and we will have that new life also.



Our holy pictures have radiances or halos around the heads of saints and around the head of Jesus the halo has actual arms of the cross. You can always tell which person is Jesus by this special halo.



Time to Celebrate

- Read John 15:1-17 and discuss it together during the week. Monday talk about staying connected to Jesus like the vine (1-3). Tuesday talk about the fruits we will produce (4-6). Wednesday talk about what Jesus has taught us (7-10). Thursday talk about what friendship is (11-15). Friday talk about how lucky we are to be chosen by God (16-17).

Dad and mom were working on the dining room table. There were pictures spread out everywhere and pages of words. We have not had dinner in the dining room for weeks because of their project.

"What is all this?" I asked.

"We're on the booklet committee for the church's anniversary. We are putting together the history of our church," dad said.

Mom showed me an old black and white picture of a bunch of men and women standing in rows with a priest in the middle. "These are

the founding families of our church. Each family gave money so our church could be built. Before our church was built the people used another church for services once a month when an Armenian priest could come. After many years these people in the picture saved enough money to buy the land and build the church."

"Look at this picture," dad said, showing me a picture in color. There were many people standing on the front steps of the church with the priest. "Some of these are the sons and daughters of the people in the first picture. These people were responsible for building the church hall. Before the hall was built we used the space under the church for our hall and church schools."

"And here is the next picture. This is the committee that helped build the classroom and activities

building next to the church," mom said, showing me a pretty recent picture of people I recognized even though they are older now than in the picture.

On the table were eight photographs of the church. I was looking at about 70 years of our church's life. "Our church has really grown!" I said.

"From 23 families to 276. We have grown. Having an anniversary celebration gives us the opportunity to look back at our beginning, enjoy our present and think about our future," dad said.

Taking a Closer Look

Jesus' followers were very confused and scared after his crucifixion. They were amazed at his resurrection. For 40 days after, Jesus stayed with his followers. He continued to teach them and tell them what was coming. He told them that soon the Holy Spirit would come to them and be their guide and helper. He told them to go throughout Jerusalem and then the world teaching others about God and the Good News of the new life ahead with God.

Then Jesus went up to heaven to join the Father. This is the day we call Ascension.

Fifty days after the Resurrection (ten days after the Ascension) the disciples met in the same room they had

gathered in for their last supper with Jesus. This time when they were there the Holy Spirit came to them. This event is called Pentecost and we call it "the birthday of the church." (Acts 2: 1–4) From that day the disciples started their mission of spreading the Good News.



The word church means a community of believers and it also means the building built for worship by the community. So the church is people and the church is a building.




Getting Closer to God

Jesus picked twelve men to teach what was wonderful and exciting about God. The twelve followed Jesus everywhere and learned from him. They were amazed at his miracles, thrilled when he answered tough questions people asked him, and touched when they saw him help others. Jesus brought people closer to God. The people were so much happier. The twelve original disciples and the other men and women who also followed Jesus wanted to be just like their Lord. They wanted to be his *disciples*.

A disciple is someone who learns from a special teacher.

After the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus, his disciples knew they must continue what Jesus was doing. They were now the teachers and others followed them. They told the people the **GOOD NEWS** that Jesus made it possible for us to live a truly complete and happy and good life and to be with God in heaven after we die. The disciples had a mission to teach people everywhere.

The Good News is that Jesus rose from the dead and gave us the promise of a truly good life on earth and eternal life with God after our life on earth is finished.





Our Armenian Way

St. Thaddeus and St. Bartholomew are the two disciples of Jesus who came to Armenia. St. Thaddeus was the first disciple to go to Armenia. He preached in Syria and places in present-day Iraq before he entered Armenia in 44 AD and made many converts.



A convert is one who changes from one belief to another.

Among those he converted was Princess Santookht. Her father did not want her to be Christian. He wanted his daughter to worship his pagan gods. When she refused, he had her put in prison. The king had St. Thaddeus killed in 66 AD. Finally the king had his guards bring his daughter to him and put a crown and a sword on a table for her to choose. If she chose the crown, she would become a pagan queen. If she chose the sword, she would die with her new faith. She chose the truth of Jesus Christ over the false gods of her father. The king had his guards take her out and she was put to death.

Santookht was a martyr. A martyr is someone who dies for his or her faith.

St. Bartholomew (who is also called Nathanael) went to Armenia after St. Thaddeus. He preached in Arabia and Persia (present day Iran) before going to Armenia. There he was martyred in 68 AD.

Christianity spread in Armenia but in secret as the pagan kings would have Christians killed. Later, in 301 AD, King Drtad, Queen Ashkhen and the king's sister Princess Khosrovitookht were converted to Christianity by St. Gregory the Enlightener. Armenia became the first Christian nation.

An "Enlightener" brings the light of God to the people.

Churches were built. Seminaries were started to teach men how to be priests. About 100 years later, in 406 A.D., St. Mesrob created the Armenian alphabet so the Bible could be written in the language of the people. Writings from the early church leaders were translated into and

written in Armenian so we could be the new disciples of Christ.

Getting Closer to God

The Sunday worship service of the Armenian Church – the Badarak – is our special time with God each week. Through this service we strengthen our relationship with him. We talk with God, we pray to God, we worship God. We sing together the wonderful songs that tell us how good God is, how powerful God is, how amazing God is. We speak to God as his family.

We receive his strength through Holy Communion. Our separate minds and hearts join together as one, just as the separate parts of our body – arms, legs, head – are joined together as one.

The Badarak has four major parts:

The Preparation – We get ready, the priest gets ready, and the church is made ready.

The Teaching – We hear God's words to us through the Bible readings and the priest's sermon and proclaim our faith through the Creed.

The Sacrifice – We share the meal Jesus has for us to strengthen our spirit and faith.

The Last Blessing and Dismissal – We are blessed with words of encouragement for the week ahead and leave singing about God's blessings.

During the **Preparation**, the priest dresses in special clothing called vestments The deacons help him dress. With each vestment he says a special prayer to make him worthy to offer the Badarak.

We get ready also. We dress nicely to come to church. When we arrive, we cross ourselves as we enter the church. When we get to our pew, we say the Lord's Prayer silently. We may light a candle and say special prayers for our own special needs. We are ready to confess our sins and receive God's forgiveness. We look forward to God's special meal – Holy Communion. We are ready to worship with everyone else in church saying the prayers together.



Our Armenian Way

The priest comes to church and puts on special clothes called vestments. He is putting on the "Armor of God" – like a uniform for the work he is about to do. As he puts each part on, he prays.



He starts with a headpiece called a **crown** and says:

Lord, put the helmet of salvation upon my head to fight against the powers of the enemy.

He takes the crown off and continues to dress and when he is finished he puts the crown back on.

Here are some of the other prayers he says as he dresses:

When he puts his stole (*poroorar*) on, he says: *Clothe my neck with righteousness, and clean my heart of sin.*

When he puts a **belt** (*kodee*) on, he says: *May the belt of faith encircle me round about my heart and my mind; and may the power of your grace live in my heart and mind at all times.*

When he puts on the cuffs called **maniples** (*pazban*) on each arm, he says: *Give strength, Lord, to my right and left hand and wash me that I may serve you in health of soul and body.*

When he puts his **cape** (*shoorchar*) on, he says: *Clothe me with a radiant garment and give me strength against evil.*

Finally, he puts his crown back on and says: *My soul will rejoice in the Lord, for he has clothed me with an outfit of salvation and with a robe of gladness.*

The priest is ready to come out of the dressing place called the **vestry** and take his part in our worship.

As the priest is getting ready, we ready ourselves for worship.

How do you get ready for church?

What are some prayers you might say as you get dressed Sunday morning?

Here's one idea:

As you put on your shoes – God, guide my steps to your holy place.

Jesus had fans. They followed him about and listened to every word he said. They didn't get his autograph, but they did ask for things – healing, lessons, answers.



Our Armenian Way

Thaddeus and Bartholomew, two of Jesus' disciples, came to Armenia to pass on to the Armenian people what Jesus had taught them. They made disciples of many Armenians who, in turn, taught others. In this way Christianity spread throughout Armenia.

Who is called the "Second Enlightener" of Armenia? Clue: He made Armenia officially Christian in 301 A.D.

Our Catholicos, bishops, priests, parents and Sunday School teachers are Jesus' disciples today, passing on to us the great teachings of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. And you are a disciple, too. Below are 5 lessons Jesus and then his disciples taught. If you had to teach them to someone else, which would you teach first? Second? Last? 
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Taking a Closer Look

St. Nersess the Great was head of the Armenian Church in the 4th century. He was Catholicos for twenty years (353–373). He loved his people and he wanted to help them in all the ways that Jesus taught us to help others. He did not want people to be hungry, lonely, in danger, sick without care or without a roof over their heads. He wanted Christ to be in everyone's heart. But they needed to feel God's love from others first. He did so much to care for the people of Armenia that he is now known as "the enlightener of the hearts of the Armenians."

St. Nersess used his own land and asked the rich lords of Armenia to donate their land to build amazing places for the good of the people. Find out what some of these were!

Lord, you are our Father and we are your children. You unite us and make us a family. You are there when we celebrate the special moments of our lives because you want to be with us and we grow with your blessing and grace. Amen.



Families share special events, special times. Some of these times are very happy and some are very sad. Some are new beginnings and some are endings. Here are some special times to think about:

the birth or adoption of a child

initiation into a special group or club such as Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts

admitting our mistakes to each other and giving our loving forgiveness

the sharing of a special holiday meal

a wedding

- a graduation
- a funeral

We want the people we love most to be with us at our special times and we want God to be with us also. There are seven very important times when we are sure to include God in those events. We call them the **SEVEN SACRAMENTS**. Not everybody has all these seven events happen in their life, but all members of the Armenian Church do experience at least four of them.







Here is the list of the **SEVEN SACRAMENTS OF THE ARMENIAN CHURCH**.


- 1. The Sacrament of Baptism being born again or adopted into God's family.
- 2. The Sacrament of Chrismation being marked with holy oil as special to God.
- 3. The Sacrament of Penance recognizing our sins and asking God's forgiveness.
- 4. The Sacrament of Holy Communion Jesus said, "Eat this bread in remembrance of me. This is my Body. Drink this wine in remembrance of me. This is my Blood."

All of us have received these first four sacraments.

- 5. The Sacrament of Marriage or Holy Matrimony when two people become one new family.
- 6. The Sacrament of Holy Orders when a person becomes officially ordained into church service – as an acolyte, deacon or priest.
- 7. The Sacrament of Extreme Unction and Prayers for the Sick – the anointing of a priest who has died and prayers for the sick.

We witness in church all the time. We witness to tell the truth about events. At a baptism, we witness that the child became a member of God's family. At a wedding we witness that two people married and became a new family. At confession time in church, we witness that people are sorry for their sins.

We are members of the Armenian Church. We witness the sacraments. We share in the event by being with our

fellow Christians. It is an important part of being a community of believers. God is present and our Christian family is present at these events. In earlier centuries, and even today in some places, baptisms and weddings take place for everyone to attend, as one big church family. But these are now mostly invitation-only events.


Our Armenian Way

It is the practice of the Armenian Church to baptize babies in their first few months (40 days is the traditional guideline). When a baby is baptized in the Armenian Church, that baby receives the sacrament of baptism, the sacrament of chrismation, and the sacrament of Holy Communion! We call these three sacraments together the sacraments of initiation. They start the baby in his or her Christian life.

Gregory Baptizes King Drtad In Euphrates River

301 AD. Hundreds gathered along the banks of the Euphrates River to witness the baptism of King Drtad and the royal family by Bishop Gregory. The king was recently healed from his illness by Gregory who was released from his imprisonment of 13 years in the pit at Khor Virab by the king. Upon the restoration of his health, the king accepted Christ and wished to become a Christian.

This amazing change of heart from persecutor of Christians to becoming one himself shocked the nation. There has been an underground Christian community in Armenia for three centuries. It is even said that the king's wife, Queen Ashkhen, and his sister, Princess Khosrovitookht, were following Christ. Now Armenian Christians can worship openly with their king.

Getting Closer to God

Baptism is our first sacrament.

Jesus was baptized. What do you remember about his baptism?

Turn to Matthew 3: 13-17. Imagine you are there.

What do you see?

What do you hear?

Along with the sacraments of Chrismation and Holy Communion, Baptism brings us into a holy life, our life with God. We are called to holy living and our parents and godparents respond by having us baptized. This sacrament opens the doors of heaven to us, making us a child of God. Christ is now our brother. The grace of God can now

enter our lives. With baptism we are adopted by God. God becomes our heavenly, spiritual father. A new bond and closeness begins.

Parents choose a godfather (gnkahayr) and godmother (gnkamayr) to sponsor their child at baptism. The priest asks the godfather, "What does this child want?" and the godfather replies, "Faith, hope, love and baptism." Our parents and godparents guide us

to living a God-pleasing life, a good life.

As we grow up to adulthood our parents and godparents, our grandparents and Sunday School teachers, our priest and our church are there to help us live a holy life. What do you think shows we are living a holy life?

Jesus called himself the LIVING WATER. Being baptized in water we are born again of the Holy Spirit. We have a new life through the living water of Jesus Christ.

Our Armenian Way

In the Armenian Church, a special necklace is prepared by the priest to place around the baby's neck. It is made of two strands of ribbon or yarn, one red and one white. Red is the color of blood. It is a symbol of life and of sacrifice. White is a symbol of purity. A cross is placed on the narod. Together they represent Jesus himself. To place this around the baby's neck is a beautiful way of saying: "You are now walking with Christ. He is with you and around you!"

MY WSRLD

I was born with this beauty mark under my right eye. Most people don't even notice it. I never paid much attention to it either until our family reunion last year. Thirty of us Haroutunians gathered at my Aunt Barbara's home for some good food, fun, and sharing of stories and memories. All of us are descendants of Sarkis and Satenig Haroutunian. They had eight children, 22 grandchildren, 7 great-grandchildren of which I am the youngest.

Aunty Barbara set up a big photograph display on the wall with Sarkis and Satenig at the top. I stood looking at the pictures for a long time and I noticed every one of my

grand uncles and grand aunts had a beauty mark under their right eye except Uncle Vahan. His was under his left eye. I looked up at the photos of Sarkis and Satenig and there under Satenig's right eye was a beauty mark also. WOW! Then I started looking at the first cousins and found most of them had a beauty mark either under their right or left eye.

I went over to Grand Uncle Vahan and asked him why his was on the left side. He told me he was a lefty while all his brothers and sisters were righties. WOW! I went back to the cousins' pictures and checked left and right sides and then went to ask if they were lefties or righties.

We're a big, loving, proud Armenian family. We think of our non-Armenian relatives who married into our family as Armenians too! Most of us have the Haroutunian beauty mark. It is our special mark, our special sign of membership. My brother Harry joked with me and said his must be invisible because he really doesn't have one but wishes he did.

Most people don't even notice the beauty mark, but I know it is there. It is always there and I love that it ties me to this family. I am proud of my family and I want my family to be proud of me.



Holy *muron* is the special oil the church uses in the sacraments of baptism, chrismation and unction. During the sacrament of chrismation the priest anoints the person with holy *muron* in nine places – eyes, ears, nose, mouth, hands, feet, heart, back, and forehead.

Our Armenian Way

Holy *muron* is made every seven years. The priests at Etchmiadzin make it by mixing olive oil with the essential oils of many flowers and the *muron* left from the last time it was made. When it is ready to be blessed, the Catholicos stirs the pot with the golden arm which holds a relic of St. Gregory the Illuminator.



Priests and representatives from Armenian churches around the world come to witness the making of *muron*. When it is done, each Bishop who is the Primate of a Diocese takes a container of *muron* back to his Diocese and distributes it to all the churches in his Diocese.



Look at the pictures of the making of *muron*. Here are some of the traditional ingredients.



Do you know what each of these are? Look them up in a dictionary.

Oil was used in Jesus' time for many purposes such as creating light in oil lamps, treating hair and skin, in cooking of course, for treating wounds, caring for animals, and in religious services.

In Jesus' time not everyone was educated to read and write. Marks were important ways to know what belonged to whom. Back then and today, sheep and cattle are marked or branded to show who owned them. Kings had special rings or seals that would be used to mark their written orders. Soldiers may not have been able to read the signature of the king, but everyone knew the king's sealing mark.

Chrismation marks a person as belonging to God. The holy *muron* does not remain visible, but all who have been chrismated know they are now part of the special group of God's people.

Time to Celebrate

Many Christian symbols show others that a building, a house, a car belong to people who are Christian. Some people put crosses on walls in their homes. Some people wear cross jewelry. Some homes have religious statues on their lawns. Buildings with crosses usually are churches or church property. People put the Christian fish symbol magnets on their cars which show they are Christian.

All these are outer and visible signs of Christianity. Our anointing with oil at our chrismation doesn't show. It is a very personal and intimate mark of our belonging to Christ.

- Today's lesson highlighted the sacrament of chrismation as a mark of membership in God's
- family and the sealing with holy *muron* of our commitment to live a holy life. Students
- discussed the symbolism of the nine parts of the body blessed at their chrismation and created
- their own pretend *muron*. They also imagined and drew their own symbols of faith.

Living Our Faith

- Try one of these family activities at home this week:
- 1. Create a family crest or seal. You might want to do this on your computer and print out labels that your family can place on items in your house that are representative of your family such as family pictures, or a family Bible.
- 2. Gather different kinds of oil that you have in your house cooking oil, machine oil, baby oil, lubricant oil. Talk about the use and purpose of each. Oil a pair of scissors with your lubricating oil. Rub baby oil on the back of your hands. Squirt a bit of machine oil in an
- appliance that needs oiling. Finally, have the whole family make a salad and have your
- fourth grader add the salad oil to it.

Dad told me that the Bible says children should obey their parents, especially when the parents are trying to help their children grow into good adults who love God and do right.



Dad said doing something wrong is like a heavy yoke on a person. I asked dad what a yoke was. He said farmers have a wooden thing they put on the cattle to attach the plow to dig up the dirt. And people put a yoke on their shoulders to carry two buckets of water or other stuff at each end.

I told mom about feeling like a big stone was on me when she and dad caught me playing the video game. I guess that was like the yoke's burden. 

Getting Closer to God

We feel close to God when we talk to him. Every Sunday we get a chance to talk with God about what we have done wrong during the week so God can strengthen us to do better in the future. We do this when we confess our wrongs, our sins, to God and then receive Holy Communion. Here is what we say:

- I have sinned against the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.
- I confess before my fellow Christians and before God all my sins.
- I have sinned by thinking wrong things, by saying wrong things, by doing wrong things.
- I sinned on purpose and accidentally.
- I have sinned by letting my **pride** hurt others, by being meanly **jealous** of others, by being **angry** with others, by being **lazy** and not doing what I should, **by wishing I had what others have** and being upset with them because they have what I



being upset with them because they have what I want, by **eating too much** while others in this world go hungry, by **wanting more** and more instead of being content with what I have and sharing with others.

- I have sinned because I didn't do what I know God would want me to do and I did things God would NOT want me to do. I knew what was right and what was wrong, but I didn't care. I know what Christians should do, but I didn't do the Christian things I should. I was tempted to do the wrong things and didn't stop myself. I could have done good things but I didn't. I feel miserable, God, because I am not behaving like the good Christian I really want to be.
- I have sinned against God.
- I will ask the priest, who is your representative, to release me from feeling tied up by my sins.

Our Armenian Way

You just learned the group confession as recited in the Armenian Church. It used to be done before Badarak starts, but now we do it just before Communion. It is our time to make things right with God after a week of small and big sins. God knows we are not perfect and every day we have opportunities to do or not do what God wants. Confession gives us all a chance to say to God: I know I have sinned and I am sorry. Please forgive me and strengthen me to make right choices in the future. We have individual confession also. Sometimes people want to confess their sins in private with the priest. It gives them a chance to talk more about what they have done wrong and to get the priest's help in finding the right way to do things. Anyone who wants private confession can call the priest and set up an appointment.





Taking a Closer Look

Uunnion ME-GHA AS-DOO-DZO. This is the phrase we say after each part of the confession. It means "I have sinned against God" and it is our way of acknowledging that we have made a mistake, a wrong choice. It is a form of CONTRITION which means recognizing that we have done wrong and saying it.

- who has hurt me." Then let the balloon go. Do this as often during the week as you feel
- comfortable.



He had a great view of the bride coming down the aisle and going right up to stand in the chancel next to his cousin Ben. Ara's mom was a Sunday School teacher and every few minutes he would ask her about what was going on.

"Mom, why are they sitting in those tall chairs that look like thrones?"

"Well, they are now going to be like a king and queen of their own home. In a way, they left their families and are starting their own little kingdom, right?"

A bit later, Ara asked: "And why is Der Hayr tying that braid around each of their heads?"

"Those are crowns, just like a king and queen are crowned. But these are red, white and green braids. Remember your baptismal narod? Well, this is the same with the red and white strands that stand for purity and sacrifice. The green stands for new life since the new couple might someday grow to be a family.

"And now why are they sipping from the same cup of wine?"

'Why do you think they are, Ara? What might it stand for?"

Our Armenian Way

Sometimes a person feels "called" not only to live a godly life but to serve God in a very specific way. Maybe it's to hold a candle at the altar. Maybe it's to assist the priest at the altar as a deacon. They will serve and learn and when they are ready, the bishop will ordain them in the sacrament of ordination or holy orders.

Sometimes, a person feels so strongly about serving God and bringing others to know him that he will want to give his entire life to this job and become a priest.

Where would he go to study? To a Seminary. A Seminary is a special school for preparing to work in the church. Men and women can study to work as teachers, educators, and youth workers, for example. But above all, men can study to be priests. St. Nersess Armenian Seminary in New York State is very well known - the only Armenian Seminary in all of North America. Those who attend learn the details about what the Armenian Church believes, and study the Bible, the church services, prayers, and the sacraments. Often they will go to Armenia or Jerusalem to study more. In the end, they earn a Master's Degree. And when he is ready, with all the necessary knowledge, he is ordained by the bishop in a beautiful ceremony.

- has a sponsor or godparent. Godparents sponsor the child in baptism. In marriage the best man is called the godfather of the cross.
- wears special clothes; he is vested. At baptism, the baby is dressed in white; the bride and groom wear special clothing.
- declares his faith in a creed
- receives Holy Communion

Harry explained that he belonged to the Armenian Church and the priest visits members who are sick to say prayers for their healing.

"I learned in my Sunday School that Jesus cares for us. He healed many sick people. God wants our lives to be good with all of us caring for each other. One of the ways we care for each other is to pray for each other."



"Do the prayers help?" Harry's neighbor asked.

"Yes. They remind me that God loves and cares for me and so do the people in my church no matter how healthy or sick I am. The prayers help me deal with this sickness."


Getting Closer to God

The priest in the Armenian Church has two roles. He represents God to the people and he represents the people to God. When the priest prays, he prays for his entire congregation. He prays as their representative.

When the priest visits people who are sick, he represents the entire parish and he represents God. He prays with and for the person who is sick. He places his hands prayerfully on the person and blesses him.

The priest helps us get closer to God.





Our Armenian Way

In the Armenian Church, this seventh sacrament is really two. One, is for all people: "prayers for the sick." The other is reserved just for priests who have died and is called "extreme unction."

When an Armenian priest dies he is buried in his priestly vestments. All his brother clergy attend the funeral.

A bishop officiates at his funeral service and anoints the priest's body with holy oil. A priest is anointed when he was chrismated, just as we all were. But then he was anointed again as a priest, on his right hand, the one

that he would use to bless with the sign of the cross and to consecrate the bread and wine. When he dies, he receives the "final or "extreme" anointing or "unction."

Today we reviewed our "sacraments savvy" so far and learned about the seventh sacrament, the prayers for the sick and extreme unction. - Sometimes we give money and food to the needy because God wants us to think about those who are less fortunate than we are and help them.











Our Armenian Way

On January 6th, as part of the celebration of the Revelation of Christ or Christmas, the Armenian Church conducts the service of the **Blessing of Water**. A person is chosen to be the Godfather of the Cross. A large bowl of water is brought to the altar. Holy Muron is dripped from a dove container into the water. Then the cross that



the Godfather holds is put into the water. The cross represents Jesus and putting it into the water represents his baptism. Prayers are said and hymns are sung for this special celebration. The cross is brought out of the water and the Godfather holds it again. After services are completed, the people come forward and take a portion of the holy water. They kiss the cross the Godfather holds. This is part of how we celebrate Christmas in the Armenian Church.

Time to Celebrate

When is Christmas?

The Early Church (Christianity in the very beginning) decided that the birth of Christ should be celebrated on January 6th. The actual date of Jesus' birth was not known, but the Church wanted to commemorate and celebrate it, so a date was set. At that time there was only one Church. Later, the Church separated into Western (Roman Empire) and Eastern branches.



Almost all churches now celebrate Christmas on

December 25th. This is because in the Roman Empire the pagan people celebrated the winter solstice (return of the sun) at that time. Church leaders thought it would be a good idea to replace this pagan feast with the celebration of Christmas.

The Armenian Church continues to celebrate the birth of Christ on the ancient date of January 6.

In the Armenian Church we celebrate the revelation of Christ or Epiphany. It includes the **Birth** of Jesus, Visit of the Wise Men and the **Baptism of the Lord** when the Dove of the Holy Spirit appeared and God's voice from heaven said "This is my Son."

All holidays have special foods associated with them. In the tradition of the Armenian Church a special dessert called *anooshaboor* is made by cooking wheat, stewed fruits and nuts together. Yummy!

Jesus has been compared to a rock. He is the rock that became the cornerstone of the new relationship with God. When a building is being erected, the cornerstone is the first stone laid in the corner where two walls begin and form the first part of the new building. Later, it would be placed anywhere but was thought to be the most important stone, often marked with names and dates to dedicate it.

God was building a new creation. Jesus holds it together for us.

Our Armenian Way

During the days before and after Easter, the Armenian Church has many special services that give us the opportunity to be with God in a remarkable way. Celebrating Poon Paregentan, attending Lenten services, rejoicing on Palm Sunday, going to the Holy Week services, renewing ourselves at Easter, commemorating the Ascension of the Lord to Heaven, and remembering that the followers of Christ started the Church at Pentecost, are all of the ways we Armenian Christians remember what Easter means.

OUR SALVATION HISTORY AND THE EASTER CYCLE

- \cdot God made heaven and earth and everything on the earth.
- He created all living things. In the story of Adam and Eve we see how the first people enjoyed a life of direct contact with God in the Garden of Eden which was an earthly paradise.
- We celebrate the beauty and perfection of that paradise with the Feast of Poon Paregentan.
- God told Adam and Eve they could have everything there except they must not eat the fruit of one tree. Adam and Eve sinned by disobeying God. Eve and Adam ate from the *Tree of the Knowledge of Right and Wrong*. God punished Adam and Eve by sending them out of the Garden of Eden so they could not eat from the *Tree of Life*.



- **The Expulsion** of Adam and Eve is the first story of the **Sundays of Great Lent**.
- \cdot The Bible tells us how we can get back to a new paradise heaven.
- The Second Sunday of Lent tells the story of the **Prodigal Son** (Luke 15:11-32). He leaves his wonderful home and father to live life in his own way. He soon finds himself without money and without friends doing a job he hates. He realizes he made the wrong choice. He decides to go back and ask for a job with his father because he knew having the worst job at his father's was better than the terrible life he was living. On his way back his father sees him on the road and welcomes him because it was as if his son had died and now was alive again. The story teaches us if we truly are sorry for the wrong things we do and the wrong choices we make and we want to put things right again, God welcomes us.

- The Third Sunday of Lent tells the story of the **Steward** (Luke 16:1-13) who was trusted to do a good job managing his employer's business. He did not and when the employer demanded an accounting of the business, the steward went to all those who owed his boss and made deals with them to collect some of what they owed. He knew his boss would fire him anyway, but he hoped he could get a job with one of the people with whom he had made a deal. Jesus tells us that if we can be clever like the steward to provide for ourselves on earth, we should also try hard to live a life that would please God. God hopes we will do right things and make right choices.
- The Fourth Sunday of Lent tells the story of the **Judge** (Luke 18:1-8) who would not bother with a widow's problem. The woman was persistent and went to him every day asking for his help. Finally the judge helped her just to get rid of her, not because he wanted to be fair. Jesus teaches us that we should always pray because God listens to our prayers and answers them fairly. He is a loving God. He cares for us and wants us to talk to him in prayer.
- The Fifth Sunday of Lent is called **Advent or the Second Coming.** The word advent means "coming." This day reminds us that Jesus will

come again and that we need to always be prepared for him by living by God's rules.

- Holy Week starts with Palm Sunday which celebrates Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem and continues with many others that recall the Last Supper, Jesus' lonely prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane, his crucifixion, and burial.
- Easter is the way Jesus opened Paradise to us again. He did this by his death and resurrection. JESUS IS THE TREE OF LIFE. When we receive Holy Communion we eat the fruit of that tree. Adam and Eve were not allowed, but we are!
- The Feast of the Ascension commemorates Jesus rising to heaven to make a place for us.



 \cdot The Feast of Pentecost celebrates the birth of the Church – us! All those who believe in Jesus are the Church.

Our Armenian Way

The story of the Assumption of St. Mary is not found in the Bible. It is found in other very early writings of the Church. Like the Transfiguration, this feast is one of the Five Major Feast Days of the Armenian Church.

Years after the resurrection, St. Mary, Jesus' mother, died. She was buried in a tomb as was the custom of that time. The disciples and others heard angels singing around her tomb day and night. The disciple Bartholomew had been away when Mary died and when he returned he wanted to see her body and say his good-bye to her. Her body was gone. Jesus had taken it to heaven.

There is a special tradition on this feast day to

bless grapes. Most plants grow from seeds, but grapes grow by planting the vine, not the seed. The Church uses the example of new grapes coming from the vine to show that Jesus came from God through Mary. Jesus was born of the Holy Spirit, not of man.

On the Feast of the Assumption, celebrated in August, the priest blesses grapes and everyone gets some grapes to eat and enjoy. It is an Armenian Church tradition.

Taking a Closer Look

Grapes are the fruit of the vine. Jesus is the fruit of God. Grapes are used to make wine. At the Lord's Supper Jesus held up a cup of wine and told his followers to drink it

to remember him. We eat the bread which is dipped in the wine. They are the Body and Blood of Jesus when we take Holy Communion.



MULTINATIONAL FORCE WINS HOLY CROSS FROM PERSIANS

Special report - 628 AD - town of Karin, Armenia



Today Christians throughout the world celebrate the victory of their armies which have marched on the Persian Empire and won back the Cross of Jesus Christ.

A little history first, dear readers. In 610 AD, the Persian King Khosrov with a large army attacked the Byzantine Empire. Enthusiastic about the initial victory, in 614 AD the Persian army entered Jerusalem. Many people were killed and many people were imprisoned. The Persians entered the Church of the Holy Sepulcher and took the Holy Cross.

Three months ago, the Byzantine army led by the King Heracles fought against the Persians to rescue the Holy Cross. The Armenian army regiment, led by Mzhezh Gnounie, supported the Persian army. With the Lord's help, the Byzantine army won the battle. The Holy Cross was solemnly brought to our town today, from where it will be carried to Constantinople, and then to Jerusalem.

Huge crowds gathered by the roadside as the army passed through. As the soldiers lifted up the cross for all to see, people were seen crying, crossing themselves, and falling to their knees.

Getting Closer to God

The cross is used in many places and in many ways. Our priest blesses us with his hand cross. There is a cross on the altar. There are crosses all around the church. There are crosses in holy pictures. We wear a cross on a necklace.

A crucifix is a cross with Jesus on it. In the Armenian Church we see a crucifix during Lent and Holy Week, but most crosses in the Armenian Church do not have the figure of Jesus on them. The empty cross like the empty tomb on Easter morning shows us Christ rose from the dead and gives us a new life after our death – life with God in heaven.





Our Armenian Way

To celebrate the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, a special service called Antasdan is performed. During this service the priest and altar servers lead us in blessing the four corners of the world.

After each of the four blessings, we join the priest and altar servers in singing "Amen, Alelooya."



A cross is decorated with basil and flowers and the priest blesses the basil.

After the service the congregation can take the basil home and use it to season their food that day.

Taking a Closer Look

Today we will make and decorate a cross with basil and flowers. Take it home and put it in your room for this week. Every day look at your cross and remember that Armenians took part in the efforts to bring Jesus' holy cross back to Christians.





Time to Celebrate

We can celebrate this feast day in our classroom. Choose classmates to be the priest, the deacon, the censor, two acolytes. The rest of the class can be the congregation.

The priest should lead the altar servers to each of the four corners of the classroom and holding the cross say:

Bless the world and make it holy by the sign of this cross.

The deacon should say:

Let us sing.

The censor should swing the incense as the class sings: *Amen. Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia.*

Our Armenian Way

Our worship service is called the Divine Liturgy. In Armenian it is **SOORP BADARAK** which means holy sacrifice. The service is the same today as it has been for hundreds of years. It is formal which means it follows a routine. This is important when everyone needs to be praying together. It has four main parts.

1. Everyone Gets Ready (PREPARATION)

2. We Listen to God's Lessons (SYNAXIS)

3. We Share Jesus in Communion (EUCHARIST)

4. We Are Blessed and Sent Back Into the World (LAST BLESSING AND DISMISSAL)

The important focus of the BADARAK is Holy Communion or Eucharist. It is "the main event." During the BADARAK we are experiencing and hearing Jesus' teachings. Then we share in him through the bread and wine of Holy Communion which has become his body and blood through the power of the Holy Spirit.


Getting Closer to God

The church prepares for worship in many ways.

- Candles are lit
- Flowers are placed on the altar
- The priest gets dressed with the help of the altar servers
- •The incense is prepared
- The gifts of wine and bread are readied

We the worshippers prepare by praying and quieting out thoughts to focus on God.

During the Preparation, the priest confesses and washes his hands. This is a way of making his heart, soul, and body pure as he prepares to lead us in worship.



Taking a Closer Look

Then in the second part of the liturgy, the Synaxis or teaching section, the priest goes up to the altar and the deacon carries the Gospel book around it to glorify the Word of God. We sing Soorp Asdvadz (Holy God). The Bible readings are next. The readers step forward to the Gospel book and kiss it. They read from the Old

Testament and from the Epistles (or letters) in the New Testament. While they are doing this, the deacon reads the Gospel to the priest. The altar servers and choir let us know the most important reading is about to start. God will be talking to us through the Gospel reading.

The deacon holds the Gospel book in front of his face and reads it to us.

Then we all recite the Creed (Havadamk).

Our teacher told us we would be going to church to see how the priest prepares for BADARAK and the first two parts of the service, the **Preparation** and the **Synaxis**. I had never seen the priest get dressed in his vestments. We sat on the floor and were very quiet. The deacons helped him put on the special clothes. Our priest said a prayer for each thing he put on.

When he was done, we went into church and sat in the first pew. The priest came out. He said his confession and washed his hands. The teacher told us the people in church are called



the congregation and the priest says his confession of sins to the congregation. After his confession, the priest went up to the altar and the curtain closed. This was the end of the Preparation part of the Badarak.

When the curtain opened, the priest came down and walked around the church with the altar servers in a sort of parade called **TAPOR**. We all got to kiss his hand cross and the teacher told us to say, "Remember me to Jesus." She told us we were asking the priest to tell Jesus we are here worshiping. The priest said "You will be remembered" back to us. He goes back to the altar and makes the sign of the cross to us giving us a blessing from God.

The priest and altar servers went up to the *altar*. It is so beautiful with the candles, cross, flowers and holy picture. Our teacher told us the altar is a special table with a covering like a roof above it. After a while, the deacon took the Gospel Book from the altar, held it up and walked around behind the altar, a little **tapor** again. We sang *Soorp Asdvadz*. The people who were going to read the Bible that day came and kissed the book as a sign of respect. Maybe one day I will be a reader. The *readers* recite from the Old Testament and the Letters of the Apostles.

While the readers read to us, I saw one of the deacons at the altar read the Gospel book to the priest quietly. Then the deacon stood in front of the altar and held the Gospel book in front of his face and read the same part to us. This is one of the most important jobs the deacon has. He also directs the congregation, telling us to stand, pay attention, bow and listen.

Right after the Bible readings, we all recite the Creed, which lists all the important things we believe.

Our teacher told us that the priest gives his sermon next or he might wait and give the sermon more toward the



end of Badarak. The readings and sermon are part of the teaching part of Badarak, the Synaxis.

We didn't stay for the Eucharist part of the Badarak when we receive *holy communion* and we didn't stay for the Last Blessing and Dismissal. We quietly left church and went back to our classroom.

Our Armenian Way



The high point of the Badarak is Holy Communion. We are present with Jesus at the supper he had with his followers before his crucifixion and resurrection. At that time he took the bread and wine, gave thanks, and shared it with his disciples. He told them that this was his Body and Blood and to do this always in remembrance of him.

When we attend church we are with Jesus again. He comes to be with us in Holy Communion. The altar table is set with the bread

and wine. It becomes the body and blood of Jesus which we are called to eat and drink to remember that Jesus was giving his body and blood to save us.


Yes, Jesus died on the cross. And yes, he rose to a new life. We will die also. And because of Jesus' sacrifice on the cross for us, we will rise again to a new life with God in his Kingdom of Heaven.

So when the priest calls us to eat and drink, we go to the altar and remember Jesus. Through his body and blood we receive our *spiritual* food to make our souls healthy. Our sins are forgiven and we have the promise of eternal life.

During confession, we think of the ways we may need to be stronger in our faith. We ask ourselves: Was I unkind? Did I lose my patience unfairly? Am I thinking of others as much as myself?

When we receive Holy Communion, we step up to the priest and make the sign of the cross. Then we tilt our heads back a bit and open our mouths and the priest puts the Communion into our mouths. He will pray for us as we do, saying: "May this be unto you for the forgiveness of sins." We make the sign of the cross again and step aside to wait until Communion is finished. The priest stands and gives a blessing; then we go back to our pews.

The end of the Badarak is the **Last Blessing and Dismissal**. It starts when the curtain opens after Holy Communion.

The priest holds the gospel book, bows three times and kisses the holy altar and comes down into the chancel. He says the prayer of St. John Chrysostom and we respond with the choir.

• Lord, who blesses those who bless you and **sanctifies** those who put their trust in you.

Blessed is God.

• Save your people and bless your **inheritance**. Guard the fullness of your Church.

Amen.

• **Sanctify** those who have greeted in love the beauty of your house. Glorify us with your divine power and **forsake not** those who put their trust in you.



Amen.

• **Grant** peace to the whole world, to churches, to priests, to Christian rulers and to their armed forces, and to all your people.

Amen.

• For all good gifts and all perfect **bounties** come down from above, from you, the Father of light; and to you is **befitting** glory, **dominion** and honor, now and always and unto the ages of ages.

Amen.

Now we all sing: Blessed be the name of the Lord from this time **forth** forevermore.

The priest says his final prayer: You are the perfection of the law and of the prophets, O Christ God our Savior, who did fulfill all your **economies** willed by the Father. Fill us also with your Holy Spirit.

The last gospel reading is read and we sing the last hymn of the Badarak: I will bless the Lord at all times; his praise shall at all times be in my mouth.

The priest blesses us before we come forward to kiss the gospel book he holds and then leave. He says: Be blessed by the grace of the Holy Spirit. **Depart** in peace and the Lord be with you always.



As we kiss the gospel book, we should say: May the Lord remember all your sacrifices.



Our Armenian Way

We kiss each other hello and goodbye as a sign of love and respect. Grandparents, uncles, aunts and parents are people we kiss in this way. In the church we give the Kiss of Peace when the deacon says: "Greet each other with a holy kiss." We kiss the priest's hand cross. At the end of the service, the priest stands before the chancel

and holds the gospel book for all to come up and kiss. As we leave the church we remember our promise to praise God and keep God with us through the week in everything we do.
