




Next God made the sky. Now please remember if you would, God saw that it was good and he smiled.


WE LEARN ABOUT GOD

When you go to bed, God's other lights come on in the sky. We call them the moon and the stars.



Welcome to the Family Page. This will be a feature of each lesson. Sharing Our Faith relates the theme of the day's lesson. Living Our Faith outlines suggested activities that pertain to the lesson's theme; choose one (or more) to do as a family.

Every Sunday, at snack time, your child will recite the Prayer Before Meals (Jashagestzook) in English and listen to it being said in Armenian. Encourage your child to say this prayer at home as well. We would like you to help your child memorize the prayer in English. While we do not expect your child to memorize the prayer in Armenian at this time, we want him/her to be familiar with it.

SHARING OUR FAITH

Today's lesson was about Creation. Your child learned that the world is a beautiful gift from God.

God created light, and He remains a light in our lives. In the Armenian Church, there is a hymn called *Aravod Looso* (Morning of Light). The children learned one verse of the hymn in English and the words *Aravod*

Looso in Armenian, and they presented it as a beautiful dance-like movement activity.

LIVING OUR FAITH

The world is a gift from God. Introduce your child to the wonders of God's creations. Choose an activity to do with your child:


- 1. Each night and each morning show him/her how to thank God for His precious gifts through prayer.
- 2. As a family, gather around a candle. As you light it, thank God for giving us the gift of light. Sing or say in English the first verse of the hymn *Aravod Looso* which has been paraphrased.
- 3. Pray before meals together:

Ja-sha-ges-tzook kha-gha-ghoo-tyamp uz-ge-ra-goo-rus vor ba-dras-dyal eh mez ee Dyar-neh.

Orh-nyal eh Der ee bar-keh-vus yoor, amen.

Let us in peace eat this meal which has been prepared for us by the Lord. Blessed is the Lord in His gifts, amen.

OUR LIFE TOGETHER



OUR ARMENIAN WAY

Blessing of the Fields Antasdan

The Armenian Church has a beautiful blessing service called Antasdan. Many years ago, the priest and the people actually went out to the fields.

The priest blessed the four corners of the land, and they prayed for rain to make the plants healthy and plentiful.

The priest also prayed for the people, the villages, the churches, the priests, the Catholicos, and the country of Armenia.

WE CELEBRATE



Now, instead of doing the Antasdan service out in the fields, the priest blesses the four corners of the world in church.

One special Sunday when that happens is called the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. On that feast day, the priest holds up a large cross decorated with basil and flowers.



SHARING OUR FAITH

Today the children learned that trees, flowers and plants are gifts from God and that we are his caretakers on earth. It is our responsibility to make sure that the trees and plants grow and the flowers bloom. Each in its own way brightens and nourishes our lives.


The children also learned about a special service in the Armenian Church called Antasdan, the blessing of the fields.


LIVING OUR FAITH

With your child, become caretakers of the earth. Encourage your child to share with you some of the discussions we had about caring for the earth and the Antasdan service.

From the following, choose an activity to do with your child:

- 1. Take a nature walk to enjoy the beauty that surrounds us in our daily lives. The Antasdan service was originally done outside, in the fields. Your walk together can be symbolic of that old Armenian tradition.
- 2. Plant and care for a flower and/or vegetable garden, remembering especially to plant basil.
- 3. Plan and plant a butterfly garden. Certain flowers and bushes are known to attract butterflies.
- 4. Feed the birds. Take out books from the library to identify birds that come to your garden. Make a birdbath available. Build a nesting box.
- 5. Pray before and after meals to thank God for his many gifts.




Mothers, fathers, grandparents, aunts, uncles and

What 'gifts' does Jesus give to you? How can you thank him?





Can you stop wherever you are and say quietly, "Thank you, God, for all you do for me?"


OUR ARMENIAN WAY

The place mat will also remind you of the feast day to honor St. Mary, the mother of Jesus.



SHARING OUR FAITH

Today our theme was giving thanks. We talked about families coming together at various times of the year to share the bonds of family love, to share food, and to give thanks to God for all his gifts.

The children heard two stories about giving thanks. One was the miracle of the loaves and the fish. Jesus blessed the food before giving it to the people. The other was the blessing of the grapes which takes place in August on the Feast of the Assumption (one of the five major feast days of the church). At that time, the priest blesses the grapes before giving them to the congregation.



LIVING OUR FAITH

Give thanks to God for his many gifts, the gifts of family, friends and food.

Choose an activity to do with your child:

- 1. Ask your child to share with you the story of the miracle of the loaves and fish, using the place mat he/she has made.
- 2. Recite the Jashagestzook prayer together before eating a meal to remember God and his gifts.
- 3. Help your child make a place mat for each member of your family.
- 4. For your next family event, help your child make a place card with a cross and the name of each guest on it.
- 5. Help your child write a prayer of thanks. Display it and say it as a family.
- 6. Help your child light a candle in church to thank God for his many gifts.

WE LEARN ABOUT GOD

God created the animals. Each one is special.

Watch a bird fly. See a horse gallop. Listen to the roar of a lion. Laugh as a monkey swings on a branch. Enjoy the gentle kisses of a puppy and listen to the happy sounds a kitten makes.

Thank God for all these amazing animals! From the lowly worm that wiggles in the wet grass to the gigantic whale swimming in the ocean – each tells us about God. God has given us the animals and asks us to take care of them. We should always treat them kindly and never hurt them.

OUR ARMENIAN WAY

A very long time ago in Armenia, artists decorated pages in books with drawings from nature, such as fish, leaves, plants, animals and birds. Even letters of the Armenian alphabet were made to look like birds. These were called *turchnakeer* (bird letters).

WE CELEBRATE


Here are some bird letters.

SHARING OUR FAITH

Today, in our lesson, the children learned that God created the animals for us, and it was his wish that we care for them. It says in Scripture that he created them and then he blessed them.

The animals remind us of God's wondrous work – the Creation.


LIVING OUR FAITH

Whether or not there is a pet in your household, you can teach your child the importance of caring for domestic animals or pets and treating them with kindness.

With your child, plan to do one of the following:


- 1. Visit the local library to take out picture books and non-fiction books about animals.
- 2. Plan a visit to a zoo with your family. God, the Giver of all life, created these wild creatures as well. He has given us the gifts of creation the earth, the sky, the water, stars, the sun and the moon and, especially the animals.
 - 3. Bird Letters (turchnakeer) and other drawings from nature have decorated ancient Armenian manuscripts since early times. Bird Letters flourished in the 12th-14th centuries. In class, the children were each given a Bird Letter to correspond to the first letter of their names. Ask your child to tell you about it.

Are you laughing?


Are you feeling dizzy as the merry-goround goes round and round?





SHARING OUR FAITH

In John 13:34, we read that Jesus tells us "just as I have loved you, you also must love one another." This week your child has learned what that means – that through our families, we share in God's love. God wants us to share this love with others.

Your loving presence in your child's life makes love real. The family circle is a sanctuary of faith and love, a place from which each child can count on mom or dad, grandma, grandpa, uncle, aunt, brother or sister to embrace him or her in love.


When you first looked into your child's eyes, you were "recruited." From that moment on, a bond of unbreakable love was created.

Choose an activity to do with your child:

- 2. Help your child make get-well cards and birthday cards to send to family members.
- 3. Make a phone call to grandparents to say "I love you. Asdvadz ser eh."



She continues to look out of the window. Where are the birds? Where are they hiding? Are they using the tree as a giant umbrella?

Ani tries to coax the dog to go outside. Even he does not want to go out on this wet day; instead he hides behind the sofa.

Today no one seems to be outside.

It is raining even harder now. Ani can barely see the house of her friend, Sonia, who lives across the street. "When will the rain stop?" Ani sighs again.



God was pleased with Noah because he was a kind and honest man. Noah did not forget God. However, there were many people who did forget him, and God was not happy with them. "Make an ark out of wood," God said to Noah. Take two of every kind of animal with you." Without asking why, Noah did what God told him to do.

God made it rain for forty days and forty nights. When the rain stopped, the ark came to rest on the mountains of Ararat in Armenia. Noah sent a dove to search for dry land. The dove flew back with an olive branch. Noah was certain that the waters were beginning to go down.

Did you ever see a worm, after a rainstorm, poking its head out of the dirt to get some air?


Did you ever hear the twittering of birds as they dip into puddles and shake their wings?

Mt. Ararat, where Noah's ark landed, has two peaks. Both peaks are always snow-covered. Many people have tried to climb to the top of the mountain to see if they can find Noah's ark. Some people think they found it!

Once more the gentle dove is the messenger of God. Noah sent the dove to search for dry land. If it returned with a branch, it would be a sign that the waters were going down. Noah and his family would be able to leave the ark and begin to make a new home, and the animals would populate the earth.



SHARING OUR FAITH


Today's lesson was about Noah, his goodness and his devotion to God. God instructed Noah to build an ark for himself and his family and two of every kind of animal. They survived forty days and nights of rain, coming to rest on Mt. Ararat.


LIVING OUR FAITH

Mary the Mother of Jesus



And then the angel left her. Luke 1:26-38




WE LEARN ABOUT GOD


LIVING OUR FAITH

A kiss, a smile, a hug, another drawing for the refrigerator door – all of these show how much you mean to your child. These simple acts and your loving response to them mean so much to the child who loves you.


These Saturday night services are called Jrakalooytz. In Armenian the word for lantern is jrak, and looytz comes from the word "to light."

The children learned that John's mission was to prepare the people for Jesus' coming.



OUR ARMENIAN WAY

In the Armenian Church, there is a beautiful service called the "Blessing of the Home" (D'norhnek). God's blessing brings peace, faith and love to the family.



Homes are usually blessed during the Christmas and Easter seasons. On the day when the priest comes to the home for the D'norhnek, the following things are given by the family to the priest for blessing:

Bread (Hahtz). We eat bread every day. It is an important part of our diet.

Water (Choor). We need water to live! Water should also remind us of our baptism.

Salt (Agh). Salt gives flavor to food. It also reminds us to live a God-pleasing life


The priest brings with him:

Incense (Khoong). The smoke of the burning incense rising upward reminds us or prayers rising to heaven, and it is a reminder that we must pray.

WE CELEBRATE

"All of the families of the earth shall be blessed." Acts 3:25

The priest offers this prayer: "May this house and all its gifts be blessed and this family be protected by the sign of the Holy Cross and the Holy Gospel. In the name of the Father and of the



Son and of the Holy Spirit now and always and for ever." Amen.



The theme of today's lesson was the wholeness and holiness of families. Jesus, Mary and Joseph were a very special and holy family. You and your child(ren) are a holy family, too. Ask your child to tell you about the Holy Family and their early life in Nazareth.

The children learned that holiness and happiness begin right in their own homes, through the many loving acts of *sharing*, *hugging*, *smiling*, *giving* and *helping*, initiated and shared by you or another member of your family.

"And in your posterity shall all the families of the earth be blessed." (Acts 3:25)


LIVING OUR FAITH




GOD'S WORD TO US










WE CELEBRATE

When you go for a visit, you run into the arms of your dear grandpa. Your mom or dad is waiting to give you a big hug when you get home from school. You feel welcomed and loved. That is how God wants you to feel about him. He loves you. He welcomes you and listens to you through your prayers.

And have mercy upon me. Amen. St. Nersess Shnorhali




Jesus told this story.

A shepherd took his sheep to the hills every morning so they could find grass to eat. One day he noticed that the littlest lamb was not with the rest. "Can I leave the rest of the sheep alone while I go to look for the lost one?"

He thought very carefully and decided to leave the sheep grazing on the hillside while he went to look for his lamb. He looked everywhere and finally found it stuck between two huge rocks. He climbed up very carefully, picked up the lamb and carried it back to the flock. He put it down gently and watched it find his way to his mother.

When the shepherd returned to his home, he told his neighbors to come for a celebration. He was so happy that he had found his lost sheep!

This is a parable. Jesus is teaching us that he will always take care of us just like the shepherd cared for his sheep and the lost lamb.





We welcome our children into the world. We open our hearts to them, and they change our lives forever. This week your child discovered how much Jesus loved children. He welcomed them despite the interference of his own disciples. He made it a point to say that the Kingdom of God belonged to the children and those like them.


Another of Jesus' missions was to carry God's message to the people. By welcoming and listening to those who came to him, he taught that God also welcomes them and hears them through their prayers.

LIVING OUR FAITH

Jesus often told stories (parables) to share an important message with the people. The Parable of the Lost Sheep is a favorite of children. Today we heard the story and discussed the great joy the shepherd felt when the baby lamb was found. God, like the shepherd, loves us and welcomes us back to his fold.

Choose one of the activities to do with your child:

- 1. Help your child retell the story of the Lost Sheep, using the props that he or she has brought home.
- 2. Sing the song "Tender Shepherd" together and often.




OUR ARMENIAN WAY

Some Armenians eat nothing that comes from an animal for the first, middle, and last weeks of Heesnag. Name some foods and drink that come from an animal.

Fifty days we wait to say Welcome, Lord, on Christmas Day!





The theme of this week's lesson was how to get ready for the birth of Jesus. As they begin to hear ways to prepare for Christmas, the children will begin to make a connection between the lessons learned in Sunday School and their application at home, where their faith was born.

In the Armenian Church, there is a fifty day preparation period before Christmas. It is called *Heesnag*. The children made a heesnag chain and will participate in a count-down to Christmas.


LIVING OUR FAITH





Through the prayers of my guardian angel, help me turn to your light!






LIVING OUR FAITH


OUR ARMENIAN WAY






The crowds had gathered on a mountainside to hear Jesus' words. He spoke to them about many things: loving one another, keeping promises, doing kind things for others, and prayer. Prayer is a way of talking with God.

Jesus said, "You should pray like this:

Our Father who art in heaven Hallowed be thy name.

Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done. On earth, as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread. Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is

WE LEARN ABOUT GOD

Jesus prayed to God. Whenever he felt lonely or sad, he would talk with God in heaven. Jesus taught his disciples the same prayer that we say in church every Sunday. It is called the Hayr Mer or the Lord's Prayer. In Armenian, *Hayr means* "father" and Mer means "our."

There are many kinds of prayer:

There is a prayer we can say before we begin to work.

There is a prayer we can say before going to bed.


There is a prayer we can say before a meeting.

There is a prayer we can say before a trip.

There is a prayer we can say before we eat, and there is a prayer we say when we finish our meal.

There is a prayer when we get up in the morning.

And, of course, there is the Lord's prayer, Hayr Mer.

anoon ko. thy name.


This means, God in heaven, we love you. We will always think of you and say your name with respect.

Jesus taught us to pray to our loving Father in heaven. Our Hayr Mer mobile will help us learn the prayer!










As you help your children learn to make decisions and choices in their daily lives, recite the Lord's Prayer as a family and remember the commitment you are making to God the Father.



Have you heard the loud claps of thunder during a rainstorm?


Perhaps you, like the disciples, looked for someone to comfort you.

People gathered to watch John the Baptist baptize Jesus in the River Jordan. They heard a voice saying, "This is my Son. I am very pleased with him." It was God's voice. At that very moment, a white dove appeared above Jesus. The people heard the words of God, saw the beautiful dove and knew that Jesus was the Son of God.

There is a feast day in the Armenian Church called the Feast of Theophany. It is celebrated on January 6. It is the day on which both the birth and baptism of Jesus are remembered. The priest uses a bowl filled with water to remind us of the river in which Jesus was baptized, a cross to




After the priest blesses the water, the people in church take some holy water home in small containers to keep or to give to someone who is sick. The blessing of the water is called Churorhnek.






WE CELEBRATE

you have supported and strengthened your child.


Choose an activity to do together.



Mrs. Kaloustian was in a nursing home. Her children lived far away. They could not come to visit her often. Many times you would find her sitting by herself. Sometimes she would get up and look at the family pictures in her room pictures when she was a young girl, pictures of her wedding, pictures of her children. She was filled with memories, but she was lonely.

Sunday was the day

when people came to entertain the residents at the home. One Sunday, children came to visit from a nearby Sunday School. They sang songs, danced and talked to the residents of the home. While they sang, someone noticed that Mrs. Kaloustian sang too. When they danced, Mrs. Kaloustian clapped her hands. And, when some small children went to talk with Mrs. Kaloustian, she hugged them. Mrs. Kaloustian was truly happy. She did not feel alone.

Take your pencil. Put a dot in this box. That dot is about the size of a mustard seed.

One day a man came to Jesus and knelt in front of him. He came to tell Jesus about his son who was very sick. "Help my son," he begged. "Your disciples could not help him."

Jesus prayed for the boy, and gradually he got well. His disciples asked him, "Why couldn't we make the boy feel better?"

Jesus answered, "You could not make the boy feel better because you did not have enough faith. Faith is trusting me and believing what I have taught you. If you have faith, even if it is no larger than a mustard seed, I will always be with you."

When Jesus' disciples wanted to know why they couldn't help the sick boy, he explained the answer. Jesus knew that they didn't yet really believe in him and trust him. "Even if you have faith no larger than a mustard seed, I'll always be with you," Jesus said.




At night, when you go to bed, you say your prayers. What do you say to Jesus? Do you pray for your family? Can you think of others who need your prayers? 



Ephesians 2:19


OUR ARMENIAN WAY

These people were also thinking about you. They wanted you to have a special place where God is present. The church is that special place because God is with us in the prayers we say and the hymns we sing.




WE LEARN ABOUT GOD

WE CELEBRATE



Every Sunday at church, we share a special greeting. The Kiss of Peace is shared with all the people in the church as it has been for hundreds and hundreds of years.

During the Kiss of Peace, we turn to the person standing next to us to share the greeting. One person leans over the right shoulder of his or her neighbor and says: "Krisdos ee mech mer haydnetsav."

(Christ is revealed among us.)

At the same time, the person receiving the greeting answers: "Orhnyal eh haydnoutiounun Krisdosee." (Blessed is the revelation of Christ.)

God wants us to have a pure heart. When we share the Kiss of Peace, we are reminded of him and his words.



Today we talked about the meaning of being together in church as a church family. "Wherever two or three are gathered in my name, I am there." This week's lesson addresses the need for people to be together, to worship together and to spread the word of God.

In keeping with that theme, we talked about the greeting or Kiss of Peace (Voghchooyn) which is passed among the congregation during Holy Badarak. The Kiss of Peace is a greeting delivering a message of hope. Christ is revealed among us. Blessed is the revelation of Christ.

LIVING OUR FAITH


Over time, many Armenian churches have been built because God wants us to be a community, a church family. He also wants us to be at peace with others and with ourselves. In sharing the Kiss of Peace, we are reminded of him.

With your child:


- 1. Practice the Kiss of Peace at home.



house, and then they drove to church. When they entered, Joseph looked around at the stain-glass windows and the painting on the main altar. He saw the Der Hayr in his vestments. He listened to the choir. Haig's mother explained to him what was happening during the Badarak.


At the end of the service, Joseph watched his friend, Haig, approach Der Hayr to kiss the Holy Gospel.



After Jesus went to heaven, his disciples were gathered together in a room. Suddenly there was a noise from heaven like the sound of a mighty wind, and fiery tongues appeared over the heads of each of the disciples. The Holy Spirit came to be with them. To their amazement, the disciples began to speak in different languages! Everyone was excited and confused.

Because they could speak different languages, the disciples were sent to many countries to tell the people about God. Two of the disciples, Thaddeus and Bartholomew, were sent to Armenia.



The disciples were sent to many places to share their faith and to welcome people into the family of God. We are all a part of God's family and God wants us to take care of each other.

OUR ARMENIAN WAY



The last part of the Badarak is called The Blessing and Dismissal. After the people recite the prayer, "I will bless the Lord at all times; at all times his praise shall be in my mouth," the priest gives The Blessing of Dismissal. He says, "May the Holy Spirit bless you. Leave the church in peace, and the Lord be with you all."

Then the congregation comes forward to kiss the Gospel Book. They leave the church, quietly, remembering the final prayers and the words of the priest.

The Gospel Book is decorated with gold and silver and precious stones.

The beautifully-decorated cover reminds us that inside the book there is also a treasure of a different kind. The treasure is the prayers and stories given to us by God.

WE CELEBRATE

The Gospel Book is called Avedaran in Armenian.

"I will bless the Lord at all times; at all times his praise shall be in my mouth!"

Today, the children went to church to take an active part in the Last Blessing and Dismissal. We learned a brief but meaningful prayer that is recited at the end of the Badarak – "I will bless the Lord at all times; at all times his praise shall be in my mouth."

The Bible passage for the day explained the Feast of Pentecost. On that day, the Holy Spirit enabled the disciples to speak in many tongues. This knowledge of languages allowed the disciples to travel to many countries to spread the word of God. Saints Thaddeus and Bartholomew traveled to Armenia to preach the word of God.


LIVING OUR FAITH

We Join the Church with Baptism






OUR LIFE TOGETHER



Harout's Sunday School class met Der Hayr in the baptistry after church. Over the baptismal font, there was a painting. Der Hayr explained that this painting showed Jesus being baptized by someone. Who? The children raised their hands to answer. "John the Baptist," they shouted.

Der Hayr also showed them a silver dove in which holy oil is kept. It is called Holy Muron. When he tipped the dove forward, some of the oil came out of its beak. "Holy Oil is made every seven years in Armenia at Holy Etchmiadzin. It is made from the oil of many flowers, and always a little bit of the old muron is put in with the new. We use the Holy Oil to bless the baby after it is baptized –the forehead, eyes, ears, nostrils, mouth, hands, heart, back and feet."

Harout remembered his sister's baptism, and he remembered what Der Hayr had said, "When you are baptized, you become a part of God's family."



John the Baptist saw Jesus walking toward him. He thought, "Here is the Lamb of God. He has come to take away the sins of the world."

John said to Jesus, "I come to baptize you with water." After the baptism, the Holy Spirit, in the form of a dove, came down from heaven and appeared over Jesus' head. God's voice could be heard saying, "This is my Son. I am pleased with him."

John said, "Now I know that this is the Son of God."

John 1:29-34

WE LEARN ABOUT GOD

Jesus' baptism was sealed by the Holy Spirit. Your baptism was also sealed by the Holy Spirit when you were blessed with Holy Oil. This blessing makes you strong, strong in making choices. Everyone who was present at your baptism prayed to God to help you make good choices in your life.

We can make good choices in God's name:



We can attend Sunday School.

We can be patient with one another.

We can be kind to one another.

We can take care of each other.

OUR ARMENIAN WAY

Chrismation (Troshm)

To bless and seal the nine parts of the baby, the priest pours some of the Holy Oil in the palm of his hand, and he begins by blessing the forehead, saying that this blessing is a gift from God. Each part is blessed with a special prayer:

The eyes – see the goodness of all things.

The ears - always hear the words of God.

The nostrils - have a sweet life.

The mouth - never speak unpleasant words.


The hands – use your hands to do good works.

The heart – always remain pure.

The back – be a shield to protect the baby.


The feet - always walk on the path chosen by God.

Then the baby is dressed in new white clothes and receives Holy Communion.



E CELEBRATE

The dove-shaped container is used during Baptism and at other services. It contains Holy Oil called Holy Muron. Holy Muron is made in Holy Etchmiadzin in Armenia every seven years.





Today the children learned about the Chrismation portion of the Sacrament of Baptism. After the baptism, nine parts of the baby's body are blessed – forehead, eyes, ears, nostrils, mouth, hands, heart, back and feet - with special prayers for each part. A dove-shaped container holds the Holy Oil (Holy Muron) which is used during this blessing. The dove, representing the Holy Spirit, can be found in many places in an Armenian Church.




LIVING OUR FAITH

The blessing or Chrismation makes the baby spiritually strong. For example, it is hoped that the blessing of the hands will encourage the use of the hands to do good works.

Encourage your child to:

- 1. Tell you the story of Jesus' baptism using the dove that he/ she made.
- 2. Think of ways to help an elderly or ill neighbor. Make a list together.



Helen was a very curious little girl. At home, she would always ask her parents questions. "How does a caterpillar turn into a butterfly? What makes thunder? How does a bird fly?"

Helen liked to go to Sunday School. She would always ask questions. "Why did Jesus wash the feet of his disciples? Did



Jesus like children? Why did Jesus tell so many stories?" The teacher would answer her questions, and Helen would think of more.

One day, Helen's mother visited her Sunday School class. She said to the teacher, "Helen always has questions. I hope she is polite when she asks them."

The teacher answered, "I like it when Helen asks questions. It shows me that she has been listening to me and is thinking about what I have said."




In the time of Jesus, people would go to the Temple to thank God. Eight days after Mary and Joseph's baby was born, he was given the name Jesus. Then on the 40th day, Mary and Joseph presented him to the Temple.

When Jesus was twelve years old, his parents took him to Jerusalem to the Temple for the Passover feast. When the feast was over, they left Jerusalem. They thought Jesus was with the other children. When they could not find him, they returned to Jerusalem and found him in the Temple.

WE LEARN ABOUT GOD



"Didn't you know that I would be in my Father's house?" What did Jesus mean when he said that to his mother? He meant that he was in the house of God, his father's house, saying his prayers.

There are three stories about Jesus' early life -one when he was a baby eight days old, another
when he was forty days old and another one when
he was twelve years old. These stories tell us that
Jesus was raised in a loving family who taught
him the ways of worship and prayer in the Temple.
Together with other families, Jesus and Mary and
Joseph became a community of the faithful.

How is Jesus' life like your life?

Do you belong to a community of the faithful?

Do you go to church with your family?

OUR ARMENIAN WAY

When he was just a baby, Jesus was presented to the Temple by his parents. This is remembered by the Armenian Church on the Feast of Dyarnuntarach.

Dyarnuntarach is celebrated every year on February 14.

In the Armenian Church, it is the tradition that newborn babies are brought to the church when they

are eight days old up to forty days old. The eighth day and fortieth day are as important to us as they were to families at the time of Jesus.


WE CELEBRATE

Armenians sometimes celebrate the feast of Dyarnuntarach in an old, traditional way. A pile of wood is made ready in the churchyard. The people leave church with candles to light the woodpile. They gather on the grounds of the church to have fun, and some even try to jump over the burning wood.

At the end of the evening, everyone goes home with a light from the fire, and they try to keep it burning until the next morning.



Today's lesson was about Jesus' early years. Tradition was very important at that time, and Mary and Joseph raised Jesus in the traditions of their faith. He was named eight days after his birth. When he was forty days old, he was brought to the Temple to be "given" to the Lord. At age twelve, Jesus accompanied Mary and Joseph to the Temple for the Passover feast.




LIVING OUR FAITH

Mary, Joseph and Jesus went to the Temple and worshipped with other families, thus laying the foundation for a community of the faithful. What do Armenian Church families do to be a community of faith?

With your child choose one of the activities below:

- 3. Take Holy Communion as a family.
- 4. As a family, go up and kiss the Gospel at the end of Badarak.





We Remember Jesus on Sunday










Der Hayr invited the kindergarten children to watch him make nushkhar. Nushkhar is thin and round, shaped like a cookie and is made out of flour and water. Der Hayr uses it for Holy Communion bread on Sundays.

First, Der Hayr measured flour and water and mixed them together by hand. Then he rolled out the dough to make it flat. He used the bottom of a glass to make the round shapes. Next he took a round wooden stamp. At the bottom of it, there was an impression of Jesus on the cross. He stamped this on each circle of dough and then baked them in the oven.

Then he surprised everyone! "You can each take one home and give it to your mother or grandmother. She can put it in her jar of rice or flour. It will be like a blessing for what is in the jars."



It was the time of Passover. Jesus and his disciples planned to eat the Passover meal together. Jesus told his disciples to go into the city to the house of a certain man. "Tell him that I want to eat the Passover meal in his home." The disciples did as Jesus asked.

During the meal, Jesus took some bread. He blessed it and broke it up into small pieces. He said, "Every time

you are together remembering me, I want you to break the bread as I have done and share it."


Then he picked up a cup of wine and gave thanks to God. He passed the cup to his disciples. He said, "Drink this. Every time you are together, remember me with blessed bread and wine."

They sang a song together and went out to the Mount of Olives.

This is known as the Last Supper.

WE LEARN ABOUT GOD



Many people all over the world break bread before each meal as Jesus did in front of his disciples.

Breaking bread means that you share your food with those who are in your home.

A group of people called Bedouins are very famous for their hospitality. They live in the desert in tents and travel from place to place. They are called nomads. They believe that, if a traveler arrives at their tent site, he has been brought there by God. They provide food, water and shelter for their guest and his animals.

OUR ARMENIAN WAY

In a small space in the wall near the main altar, the Der Hayr keeps the chalice filled with wine and the nushkhar, covered with a beautiful cloth. During the Great Entrance, the deacon brings the chalice and nushkharh to the priest who takes it and carefully puts it on the altar. He will use it later for Holy Communion, saying the words that Jesus said at the Last Supper.



WE CELEBRATE



The children heard the story of the Last Supper – when Jesus broke bread with his disciples. This was the beginning of Holy Communion. When Holy Communion is given on Sunday, we hear the same words that Jesus spoke to his disciples so many years ago.


Breaking of bread is a symbol of hospitality. Bedouins continue to break bread in this ancient way. Like the people of the Bible, they believe that any stranger arriving at their tent site has been sent by God. Therefore, they honor him and give food and shelter not only to him but to his animals.




Discuss all or one of following questions with your child:



When you are in church, what do you smell?



OUR ARMENIAN WAY

Jesus chose disciples as his helpers. The deacons (sargavaks) are the priest's helpers on the Holy Altar. They do many things to help the priest during Badarak. They read from the Bible. They carry the chalice to the priest. They use the censer that brings forth the sweet smells of incense. They also shake the kshotz during Badarak.



WE CELEBRATE



A stole is a long, narrow vestment worn by the deacon on his left shoulder. After he is given the stole by the bishop, the deacon becomes the priest's assistant.



The theme of today's lesson is honoring Jesus with words and actions.

The church is a stone and brick building until, as Jesus says, two or three people are gathered in his name. Then it becomes a living church.


Wherever we are, we carry our faith with us; the story of Jack and his family driving to church illustrated how often we can be prayerful, even in the most mundane circumstances.


The children also learned that when the deacon is awarded his stole, he becomes the priest's assistant with many duties to perform. Your child will tell you about some of them.

The Cross is a Special Sign



Silva and her family were going to visit her grandparents. As they neared the town where her grandparents lived, Silva noticed a very large cross on the steeple of a church. It was so big! She wondered how it stayed up there. She turned to her sister, Mary, and said, "Look at that cross!"

They passed two more churches before arriving at their grandparents' home.

One of the churches had a round roof with a cross on top. It reminded Silva of her church. "That is an Armenian Church," she said to her sister.

Their grandparents were outside waiting for them. "Medz Mama, Medz Baba, on our way, we saw three churches. One was different than the others."

The girls had a lot to tell their grandparents.

Grandpa explained, "The one that you describe is an Armenian Church. I am glad you recognized that it was different from the others. That round thing is called a dome. Armenian churches have that with the Armenian cross on top. Girls, how was that cross different than the two others you saw?"




Jesus was carrying a heavy cross to a hill. He stumbled a few times and could not carry the cross any more. The soldiers saw a man in the crowd called Simon of Cyrene. They put the cross on his back so he could carry it the rest of the way. The soldiers were under orders to take Jesus to the hill, called Golgotha, and to place him on the cross. Two other men were also being taken to the hill.

A large crowd was following Jesus. They were crying for him. "Do not cry for me," he told them.


A man named Joseph of Arimathea took Jesus down from the cross, wrapped Jesus' body in a white linen cloth and placed him in a tomb cut out of rock. A large stone was placed in front of the opening.

A day later, a few women came to the tomb and found the stone had been rolled away, and there was no one inside the tomb.

What had happened? They did not know what to think. Two angels in shining white clothes appeared to tell the women that Jesus was in heaven.

We believe that Jesus is in heaven. We believe that Jesus loves us very much.

OUR ARMENIAN WAY



In the Armenian Church, the cross does not show a figure of Jesus on it because we want to show that Jesus rose from the dead and lives forever.

You will see many different kinds of crosses being used in the Armenian Church. There is a baptismal cross, given to a baby when he or she is baptized; there is a cross in the center of the Holy Altar; there is a hand cross that the priest holds; there is a cross, called a pectoral cross, that hangs around the neck of a priest.

There are khachkars (stone crosses). These are slabs of stone with a cross carved on them. Each khachkar is different. You will find many khachkars in Armenia.

WE CELEBRATE

Today the focus for the children was the special place of the cross in the Armenian Church. They heard the story of the cross that Jesus carried to his crucifixion and the story of the empty tomb. Because we want to dwell lovingly on Jesus' resurrection, Armenian crosses do not show the crucified body of Christ. Crosses appear in many places in the church. Armenia is covered with khachkars (stone crosses), historic monuments to our faith over the centuries.


Your child made an Armenian cross today. We practiced making the sign of the cross in Armenian and English.

With your child, continue the practice of making the sign of the cross before and after prayers.







Johnny and Angele dried themselves off and sat down at the kitchen table. Grandma gave them a cookie and some milk She began to tell them about this tradition.


"The Feast of the Transfiguration is also called Vartavar. Before we were Christian, Armenians would decorate their altars with roses. Vart means rose. They also sprinkled water on each other. Today we do these things in happy celebration of Christ's love and glory!"

Johnny and Angele could not wait for Vartavar when they could sprinkle water on Uncle Toros!

Jesus took three of his disciples – Peter, James and John, and they went up on a high mountain where they could be alone. There, in front of them, Jesus was completely changed. His clothes were sparkling white. Moses and Elijah, prophets from the Old Testament, were with Jesus, talking to him.

The disciples wanted to stay on the mountain to celebrate.

A cloud passed over them. From the cloud, a voice said, "This is my Son. I love him. Listen to what he says!"



As they came down from the mountain, Jesus told the disciples not to say a word about what they had seen. They did not tell anyone, but they wondered about what they had seen and heard.

Mark 9:2-10

On the mountain, something wonderful happened to Jesus. He looked as if a light was shining on his face, and his clothes were dazzling with brightness. This change in the appearance of Jesus is called Transfiguration. Transfiguration is a very big word that describes what happened to Jesus.

The disciples wanted to stay on the mountain to celebrate.

In the church calendar, special events in Jesus' life are called feast days. The church family celebrates feast days in different ways.



OUR ARMENIAN WAY

Armenians celebrated the Feast of the Transfiguration, or Vartavar, in many ways. People gave bouquets of flowers to the church. They tied roses on the heads of their animals. They splashed each other with water. Sometimes, they released pigeons into the air. Old customs helped people celebrate the life of Jesus!

WE CELEBRATE

Jesus took three of his disciples to a mountain to pray. There something wonderful happened to him. And God's voice could be heard once more saying, "This is my Son."






Today's lesson was about the Feast of the Transfiguration or Vartavar. St. Gregory joined the pagan Feast of Vartavar with the Feast of the Transfiguration so they would be celebrated together. Often pagan feasts were joined with Christian ones. So we celebrate Jesus' glorious transformation on a mountaintop by using older festive traditions, such as sprinkling water on each other. In the Middle East and Armenia, people continue to surprise friends and family with a splash of water on Transfiguration Day!



During the summer months, many feast days are celebrated. The Feast of Transfiguration is one of them. Other feast days that occur in the summer months are:

- Feast of the Assumption of the Holy Mother-of-God
- Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (early to mid-September)
- · All of these are major feast days





Jesus sent his disciples to spread the word of God everywhere in the world. St. Thaddeus and St. Bartholomew were sent to Armenia. Years



later, St. Gregory
went to Armenia.
It is because of
Gregory, known
as St. Gregory the
Illuminator, that
Armenia became the
first Christian nation.

St. Gregory wrote about being holy, living by the teachings of Jesus Christ.

He said:

Do not make fun of others.

Do not make a promise if you cannot keep it.

Do not think mean thoughts about others.

Do not forget God in your daily life.

OUR ARMENIAN WAY

A long time ago, Drtad was king of Armenia. Gregory worked in his court. He was a Christian.

One day, at a feast, King Drtad asked everyone to worship a statue of the goddess Anahid. Gregory did not move. He said, "I believe in Jesus Christ. I cannot worship Anahid."

"Take him," the king roared. "Put him in the pit!"

Gregory was thrown into a deep pit called Khor Virab. He remained there for many years. But he did not die. A woman sent

by the king's sister, Princess Khosrovitookht, brought food to Gregory.

Years went by.


The king was very sick. No one could help him. The Princess thought about Gregory. She felt certain that he could help her brother. So she sent for him.



Gregory healed the king. The king, the queen, the princess and the entire royal family became Christians. They helped St. Gregory build Holy Etchmiadzin!

WE CELEBRATE

It was dark in the pit and damp. There were snakes and all kinds of insects, too. Through his prayers and through the kindness of the princess, Gregory lived. He came out of the pit and converted the entire Armenian nation to Christianity.







Today's lesson focused on how Armenians became Christian. The children heard the stories of St. Thaddeus and St. Bartholomew, the disciples sent by Jesus Christ to Armenia.

St. Gregory went to Armenia a few centuries later only to be thrown into a pit for his courage in declaring himself a Christian. Armenia is the first Christian nation (officially declared so in 301 A.D.) because of Gregory, known as St. Gregory the Illuminator.

LIVING OUR FAITH

Like the saints who went to Armenia, we must take seriously the command of our Lord to tell others about having faith and hope.

Discuss with your child some ways he or she can do so:

- 1. Share with family the lessons learned in Sunday School.
- 2. With a member of the family, look over the materials and projects brought home from Sunday School. Ask your child questions about the theme of the day.
- 3. Encourage your child to invite a friend to attend church with your family.
- 4. Pray together, as a family, so your child can see your faith in action.
