Presentation of the Lord to the Temple — February 14

The feast of the 'Presentation of Our Lord to the Temple' on February 14 provides the month with a most challenging theme of OFFERING. The word has various meanings to different people—gift, sacrifice, thanksgiving, pain, deprivation, joy, etc. And indeed, there are elements of each of the above in an offering.

The presentation of Jesus to the temple has its roots in the ancient Mosaic law, according to which every first born child was to be presented to the Lord's service. The ritual of taking the child to the Temple on the fortieth day of his birth solemnized and affirmed that offering.

Our Lord did not need to follow all the requirements of Mosaic law. However, as He said later in His earthly life, He came not to destroy the law but to fulfill it, to perfect it.

When Mary and Joseph took Jesus to the Temple, Simeon, inspired by the Holy Spirit, recognized the Messiah and blessed God. Through Christ's presentation to the Temple, all creatures who believe in Him have also been offered to God, as the words of the Hymn of the feast show us.

Today the inoriginate Word, born of the bosom of the Father, having come to the Temple, offers the creatures to the Father in heaven. (Canticle of the Presentation of the Lord to the Temple, Mode 5).

Being offered to God through Christ does not relieve us of responsibility for self-offering. On the contrary, through Christ's great offering, His sacrifice on the Cross, we have been adopted into fellowship with Him in order to live as He did and offer our life to God—and that offering is nothing but offering ourselves to each other. Such offering entails sacrifice, pain and deprivation, but also includes the experiences of joy, happiness, thanksgiving and receiving.

ance and in defense of Christianity and human dignity was no desperate search for recognition. It was the Holy Spirit working within them urging them on to preserve sacred values. They knew what their fate was to be. They realized that like the prophesies concerning Christ, they also must sacrifice themselves so that the nation might survive! It is this spirit of sacrifice that is so rare and dear — yet so obscured in the dilemma of modern society.

Although the Ghevontian group of clergy numbered a Catholicos, two bishops, two deacons and four kahanas (married priests), the outstanding leader of the group was the Kahana, Ghevont, also called lerets (the senior). A great patriarch of the Armenian Church named Malachia Ormanian wrote: "Thanks to his (Ghevont) intelligence and eloquence in addressing the Armenian Army at the Battle of Avarayr, and his ability to defend (our) Christian principles before the Persian courts and imperial prosecutors, he distinguished himself as the leading representative of the Armenian Cause, One might say that Ghevont personified the entire movement in defense of religious freedom...and for that reason, his companions are known as the Ghevontians." (Azkabadoum No. 274, pg. 402).
