

Reading Mark 16:1-8

Meditation

There's so much "hype" these days for every event. The Super Bowl gets two weeks of it. When the President gets a head cold, it becomes a major news story. And yet, for the greatest event of all time, the resurrection of Christ, there was nothing.

There could have been multitudes of angels with trumpets. There could have been heavenly hosts singing. Instead, there were three simple women walking in the morning to Christ's tomb. They were going to anoint his body with spices, part of the burial tradition at the time.

It was probably a quiet morning with birds chirping and animals rustling as the women walked. They wondered who would move the heavy stone to open the tomb for them. But

when they arrived, they found that the tomb was already open. It was empty. The resurrection had already happened! There was a young man there, dressed in white, probably an angel. The young man announced quietly, "He is risen."

There was no thunder and lightning. There were no trumpets. There were no angels singing in the heavens as had appeared to the shepherds when Jesus was born. All these things could have happened, but they didn't. Just one young man in an empty tomb on a quiet Sunday morning who appeared to three frightened women. And who was picked to be the first to receive the news? It wasn't Peter or any of the disciples. It wasn't anybody important. It wasn't even a man. In those days, women were thought of as unimportant people, just helpers to men. And yet three women were chosen to be the first to hear the most important news of all time.

Why is the story of Christ's resurrection like this? Why did it happen this way? For a very important reason. If there had been thunder and lightning, if there had been thousands of angels filling the sky, we would have to believe it happened. It would have been forced upon us. We would have no choice.

This is not what God wants for us. He always gives us a choice. God wants us to accept Christ and his love for us willingly. Gods wants us to follow Christ not because we have to, but because we want to.

So there is no scientific "proof" that the resurrection occurred. Nor should there be. But for us Christians, the
