
St. Sarkis the Warrior



"Warrior" might seem a curious word for describing a saint! And yet the imagery of spiritual warfare is deeply biblical. There were also many soldiers and generals (St Vartan) who fought for their faith, standing firm and courageous for Christ. Sarkis was a soldier of Greek descent in Emperor Constantine's army. When Emperor Julian took the throne in 361, he began to zealously promote traditional Roman paganism instead of the Christian faith legitimized by Emperor Constantine in 313. This earned him the title "Apostate." Under threat of persecution, Sarkis and his son Mardiros sought the protection of

King Tiran of Armenia. From there, he went to serve in the Persian army, where he and his son won many converts to Christianity. When they refused to worship pagan idols, father and son were martyred. Fourteen Persian soldiers whom Sarkis had converted to Christianity risked their lives to bury the general's body and they too were executed. In the fifth century, Mesrob Mashdotz moved the saint's remains to Armenia. Reflection: In what ways can you be a "warrior for Christ"?
