Lesson 4.4 The Parable of the Unjust Steward

Teacher Preparation and Materials Needed:

Scripture References: Luke 16:1-13

*Student can take turns reading this parable

Activity 1: Reflect Upon

*Can be done as a classroom by using a whiteboard or flipchart

Activity 2: The Dishonest Manager worksheet

Items needed: The printout of the worksheet and pens or pencils (found on the fourth page)

Activity 3 (optional): Honesty Key Chain

Directions: Give each child a chenille wire (florist wire) or an inexpensive key chain to hang “honesty circles” from to remind children the “keys to being honest”. Give the children round circles to decorate and write words to remind them to be honest. For example: in school, with friends, with family, with teachers. Lesson Opening & Creating Interest:

Lesson Body:

Throughout his three year ministry, Jesus taught many parables. Some are easy to understand, some are a little more difficult, like complicated puzzles. The Parable of the Unjust Steward in the Gospel of **Luke 16:1-13** is one of the puzzling ones. In some ways this parable resemble to the Parable of the Prodigal Son. Both talk about waisting one's treasures. As the Prodigal Son waisted his father's possessions (his inheritance), was left with nothing and found his way back to his father's house, likewise the unjust steward used his master's money and debtors to secure his future. He knew well that after losing his job, he would not have an income to live a lavish life he was used to. So, he decided to help others and gain friends who would be helpful to him in the future. By doing so, he received the praise of his master. This is exactly where it becomes puzzing. Is the unjust steward upheld as an admirable character?

The steward broke his master's trust, stole from him and did even greater harm by changing the amounts of debts owed to his master. Yet, the master praised him for his actions. Why do you think he did this?

Besides the importance of trust, this parable teaches us that we need to be prepared for our future, not only by securing our future here on earth (by taking our responsibilities seriously, improving our skills or saving money) but in heaven as well.

This is easily forgotten because we are constinantly told by our teachers and parents to prepare for our future by getting a good education, working hard, and making smart decisions, but rarely are we taught how to prepare for the kingdom of heaven.

Christ explains in the parable that preparing for the kingdom of heaven is just as important, if not more important, than prepaing for this life. Everything we are given in this life is to be used in preparation for the kingdom to come.

How can you use that which God has given you to prepare for heaven? Naturally, you cannot buy anything in order to secure your place in heaven. Well, what can you do? What did the steward do to prepare for his future? Is Jesus saying we should cheat people to get to heaven? How can we learn from the steward what to do and what not to do?

Great Lent is a time of reflection, sacrifice and strengthening our will to be able to say no to temptations. We can't serve two masters. The idea of having, sometimes is more powerful than the idea of needing. This is true for food and physical items. When we fast, pray and give alms, we free ourselves of wants, which are sometimes overwhelmingly too many, and are holding us hostage. Instead, we try to be grateful when our daily needs are met. Through fasting, prayer and almsgiving, we make a conscious effort to be free and only depend on God and His strength.

The Parable of the Shrewd Manager

Jesus told his disciples: “There was a rich man whose manager was accused of wasting his possessions. So he called him in and asked him, ‘What is this I hear about you? Give an account of your management, because you cannot be manager any longer.’ “The manager said to himself, ‘What shall I do now? My master is taking away my job. I’m not strong enough to dig, and I’m ashamed to beg— I know what I’ll do so that, when I lose my job here, people will welcome me into their houses.’ “So he called in each one of his master’s debtors. He asked the first, ‘How much do you owe my master?’ ““Nine hundred gallons[a] of olive oil,’ he replied. “The manager told him, ‘Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it four hundred and fifty.’ “Then he asked the second, ‘And how much do you owe?’ ““A thousand bushels[b] of wheat,’ he replied. “He told him, ‘Take your bill and make it eight hundred.’ “The master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly. For the people of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own kind than are the people of the light. 9 I tell you, use worldly wealth to gain friends for yourselves, so that when it is gone, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings. “Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much. So if you have not been trustworthy in handling worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches? And if you have not been trustworthy with someone else’s property, who will give you property of your own? “No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and money.”

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**Note: Consider encouraging the use of the 2024 Lenten calendar*

This is a fun activity for any age, a great practice to commit to a small responsibility, and improve stewardship skills.

YOU WILL NEED

1. Containers like pots, bowls and jars
2. Potting Soil
3. Wheat Berry Seeds
4. Spray Bottle Filled With Water
5. Plastic Wrap



DIRECTIONS

STEP 1: You can choose a container that you like. You can choose a few. It can be a plant pot, different sizes of bowls and cups.

STEP 2: Fill each container with potting soil. Leave about an inch of room at the top for the seeds.

STEP 3: Sprinkle an even layer of wheat berry seeds over the soil. Enough to cover the surface but not to overlap too much.

STEP 4: Using a spray bottle, spray the seeds with water. Just enough to get the seeds wet. Be careful not to overwater.

STEP 5: Cover each container loosely with plastic wrap.

STEP 6: Spray the seed every day with water and cover them back up.

In about 4-5 days you will start seeing little sprouts. Continue this process for a week. Once blades of grass are growing, you don't need to cover your container anymore. Spray the soil once a day every day. If the grass gets too tall and starts to fall over, trim it back about 4 inches from the bottom. You can use this as beautiful decoration for your Easter table.
